From the Desk of Rabbi David Wise <u>Use Your Brain</u>



The slogan "a mind is a terrible thing to waste" has been the sta-

ple catchphrase of the United Negro College Fund for more than three decades. As a Jew and a sports fan, I've come to think that a slight amendment is in order. We are learning that a *brain* is the thing we are increasingly at risk of wasting.

since the gladiators packed the Coliseum in ancient Rome with their promise of bloody spectacle, people have paid good money to watch human beings collide violently in enclosed spaces. But it's only in recent years that we have come to recognize that it's not the limbs and joints we most endanger through contact sports; it's the head trauma. Football is the sport most under scrutiny, especially after the 2013 publication of League of Denial by Mark Fainura-Wada and Steve Fainaru. In this installment of The Rabbi's Nightstand. I'll reflect on what I learned about the brain, that most precious of body parts.

League of Denial investigates the (still-) ongoing battle between a corporation, the National Football League, and the

scientists who sought to draw attention to a health risk it magnifies. The conflict is not unlike Big Tobacco and scientific study of lung cancer. The NFL markets a product that increases the likelihood of brain injury (a term that carries more weight than "concussion"), but for years the league shielded its players from knowing this rather than shielding their brains from damage.

In the few years since League of Denial was published, a number of budding NFL stars announced their early retirement, either because of concussions or fear of getting them. In March of this year, NFL official Jeff Miller admitted that there's a link between football and brain damage. These unfolding events bring to mind the words of Dr. Joe Maroon, one of the early testers of football concussions and a consultant to the pathologists who first discovered the link of football to brain injury: "If only 10 percent of mothers in America begin to conceive of football as a dangerous game, that is the end of football" (p. 206)

Two Jewish-related issues arise when considering this emerging information. Does halakhah forbid behaviors that could lead to debilitating injury or death? If smoking is the natural analogy, does Jewish law have a ruling forbidding it? In 1986, the Law Committee published a paper called Smoking: A Jewish Perspective by Rabbi Seymour Siegel. The categories he addressed in the

paper, such as "The Preservation of Health is a Mitzvah," "Danger to Life is Stricter than a Prohibition," "Do Not Rely on Miracles," and "Avoid Risk," certainly underscore the direction Rabbi Siegel would have liked to take. But the paper was never voted on by the CJLS. In his conclusion, Rabbi Siegel writes these two sentences consecutively: "It would...follow that Jewish ethics and Jewish law would prohibit the use of cigarettes. Smoking should, at least, be discouraged in synagogues, Jewish schools, and Jewish gathering places."

What happened between the first sentence, that suggests a prohibition, and the second which urges mere "discouragement?" There's a serious rabbinic principle in play here: Ein Gozrin davar she -ein hatzibbur yakhol la'amod bah-we don't enact decrees that the community-at-large cannot abide. There are two implications here: one, we cannot set so many people up to fail; two, rabbinic authority will be diminished by the mass ignoring of the ruling. It's better to discourage and make inroads than to outlaw and be rendered powerless. That's why the CJLS never voted on Rabbi Siegel's paper as a teshuvah; it merely printed it as a "statement."

The parallel application to football was stated by one of the leading experts on CTE

Ohr Chadash Tishrei Recap

The Jewish month of Tishrei is a very special month in the Jewish calendar. No other month has as many "holy days" one following the other. The students of Ohr Chadash had an opportunity this year to both learn and experience the holidays of Tishrei. Students and Rabbis brought in their shofars and blew then for all the students. Each shofar blower tried to coax the strongest, clearest and longest sounds from their shofar. The longest Tekiyah Gedolah-final solid sound-in school history lasted an amazing 45 seconds.

For slightly over three weeks, from Rosh Hashanah-the Jewish New Year-until Simchat Torah-the joyous celebration of the completion of the Torah reading cycle-the children had many opportunities to experience and put into practice what they learned in school. Beginning with attending services and praying along with their families and hearing the shofar, symbolically ridding themselves of their "sins" at Tashlich, fasting all or part of the day on Yom Kippur for the first time, shaking the lulav and etrog at services and in the Sukkah and eating some meals in the Sukkah and finally dancing with the Torah at hakafot, our students experienced some of these mitzvoth and many of the children experienced all of them.

On the Wednesday of Hol haMoed-intermediate day-of

Sukkot, Rabbis Kogan and Romano conducted the "Wednesdays with the Rabbis" in the HJC Sukkah. Enjoying the unusually warm day, Rabbi Kogan asked the children to think about the difference between a house and a home and what it means to them. Rabbi Romano taught the children the names and characteristics of the 4 parts of the lulay and etrog.

On Sunday, which coincided with Hoshana Rabba- the final day of Sukkot, the children bundled up in winter clothes shook the lulav and etrog for the final time and enjoyed cupcakes, potato chips and juices in the Sukkah. The children learned first-hand the extremes that we endure while sitting in the Sukkah.

It was a wonderful month and despite the many days off, the children learned about Tishrei and the many holidays we have the opportunity to celebrate.

(chronic traumatic encephalopathy), or football brain injury, Dr. Ann McKee (a lifelong Green Bay Packers fan, by the way): "How come I don't just say, "let's ban football immediately? I think I would lose my audience." (p. 8) So should the rabbis forbid Jews to play tackle football? Of course not. But the surgeon general's warning on cigarette packs may need a football equivalent, something like "use your brain while you still can." The very same issues Rabbi Siegel raised about preserving health, not relying on miracles, and avoiding risk are in play here. We should all proceed with eyes wide open.



Rabbi Dr. H. Joseph Simckes Life After Retirement

"WHAT A DIFFERENCE A DAY MAKES!"*

Long ago our Rabbinic sages cautioned us, "Be careful in your relations with the government for they befriend a person only for their own needs. They agree to be friends when it is beneficial to them but they will betray you when you no longer serve their purpose."**

Contemporary writers put it this way: *Politics is a dirty business!*

For a more refined analysis with richly sourced and carefully balanced socio-political references, check out Harvard University's fairly recent publication, "Why People Don't Trust Government" (1997), by Nye, Zelikow and King. Those academic fellows don't mince words.

Faith in the entrenched political elites is highly problematic. Our bloody American Revolution is powerfully emblematic of that truth.

The elections, now a matter of public record, echo it. Prior to November 8th, the overwhelming number of political pundits, media mavins, editorialists, professors, sociologists, statesmen, government analysts, pollsters, etc. all agreed:

"The Clinton political machine, their ground game and traditional democrat activists have it all sewn up. Hillary – despite any revealed and as yet unrevealed personal flaws - will be the clear winner. Her history of service and extremely high level elite government involvement as

First Lady, Senator and as Sec'y of State will be determinative."

They were...but not in the expected way. Mrs. Clinton, whose credentials as the perfect, polished Washington insider were impeccable, turned out to be less worthy of trust, less attractive, less likely to deliver the kinds of change that millions of our middle and lower economic class citizens were yearning for...because of her trailing identification with established power.

The die was cast. On November 8th our country voted: *Hillary lost*.

A new commander in chief was chosen. Vox Poluli - the voice of our traditional American political system- made its decision heard. Countless women who had looked forward to a woman finally breaking "the glass ceiling" to the presidency were profoundly disappointed...but then, there is always our next election, yes?

Peggy Noonan of the Wall Street Journal got it right. At 2:32 am on 11/9/16 she wrote, "We have witnessed something epochal and grave. It is the beginning of a new era whose shape and form are not clear, whose personnel and exact direction are unknown...The next president needs you. This is our country. Help him." ***

Where do we go from here?

The weepers and wailers, whiners and whipped fault-finders now must bind up their wounds, tighten their belts, stand up tall and straight and march proudly with their neighbors, unite with their fellow citizens towards a common goal: the building of a prosperous, free, secure and even more beautiful star spangled, glorious America.

How could it be otherwise? For we are, indeed, the fabled land of authentic freedom, the "Goldeneh Medunah"! The one place on G-d's earth where opportunity blossoms like fresh roses, where men and women of diverse origin, color, creed and often conflicting religious faith abound yet live in creative communities bonded forever in mutual respect and dignity. We are the envy of the world. Our capacity to peacefully transfer political power every four years is precisely why so many want so much to enter our imperfect yet awesomely blessed country...to join us on our rare march towards life, liberty and the shared pursuit of human happiness.

The electoral votes have been counted. Right? Now let us put our political labels aside, place our natural divisions of political opinion behind us and together move forward as one nation, resolved to confront with wisdom and courage the complex issues of shared governance which challenge us all.

We truly have much to be thankful for! Happy thanksgiving to all!




