From the Desk of Rabbi David Wise Catch-67



In 1967, Israel won its greatest victory in a mere six days. Ever since, it

has been challenged by the consequences of that victory. UN resolutions, negotiation summits, and many wellintentioned diplomats heads of state have sought to resolve the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. No one has yet succeeded. Perhaps equally troubling is the tone of discourse in Israel about the conflict. It is the source of a sometimes bitter national debate.

In 2017, Micah Goodman wrote a book in Hebrew that was not about the conflict per se, but about that internal discourse. It was one of the most widely read books in the country, sparking conversations and plenty of disagreement. Its English translation was just published this fall. For this month's edition of *The Rabbi's Nightstand*, I want to introduce you to Micah's book *Catch-67: The Left, the Right, and the Legacy of the Six-Day War.*

The author is a fellow at the Hartman Institute, the founder of Ein Prat, Israel's most prestigious army preparatory pro-

gram, and a religious Jew. His scholarly focus is Jewish philosophy, and he approaches the subject from an intellectual angle. He compares the evolution of Jewish religious thought to Israeli political thought. Just as the ultra-Orthodox view of religion left no room for gray areas, "Israeli political thought has become binary over the past fifty years: Israel is either an occupying power or a moral society; it is either in conflict or at peace; it is either settling the land or betraying its identity and values. This is the right moment to ask: What will happen if Israelis adjust the way they think about politics? What will happen if they stop seeing politics through ultra-Orthodox eyes and start seeing it through non-dichotomous eyes instead?" (p. 13)

Goodman notes how both the Israeli right and left had to adapt their priorities in recent years (the left from striving for peace to simply ending the occupation; the right from holding the entire land to emphasizing security). Those evolutions in priorities are a function of an ongoing desire to solve a conflict. But Goodman notes that both left and right are correct in their own ways. "If the State of Israel wants to defend itself from the Muslim majority surrounding it, it must not pull back from Judea and Samaria: but if it wants to defend itself from the prospect of a Muslim majority within it, it must do so. The paradox exists because everyone is correct. The right is

correct that a withdrawal from Judea and Samaria would endanger Israel; the left is correct that a continued presence in the territories would endanger Israel. The problem is that since everyone is correct, everyone is also incorrect—and the State of Israel is trapped in an impossible double bind" (p. 92)

For this reason, Goodman argues that Israelis need to stop seeing the current political reality as a conflict that must be resolved, but as a "catch"—like Joseph Heller's Catch-22. Hence the title Catch-67. How does one disentangle from a "catch?" Goodman lays out two practical suggestions, which do not purport to solve the problem but simply to restructure it, and make it more manageable. I urge you to read the book to learn about these suggestions, but mostly, read the book to understand why it is so crucial that we follow Goodman's lead. That is, to consider the words of Rabbi Avraham Yitzhal Kook, the first Ashkenzai chief rabbi of Palestine in the decades before the State was born: "And if we persevere in fighting for what is close to our hearts, we must avoid becoming fixated on our feelings and know that the world is wide enough to contain feelings contrary to our own."

May books like *Catch-67* bring light to our world, even brighter than the lights of Hanukkah!

Rabbi's Reflections Associate Rabbi Gary D. Kessler

" Beauty is Good But Goodness is Beautiful"



It is conventional wisdom that beautiful people have better

chance at success in life than ordinary looking people, and they certainly do better than homely people. Perhaps this partly explains Joseph's great success. In Genesis 39:6, we read that "Joseph was well built and handsome," he had movie star looks. Pharaoh dresses him in fine clothes. gives him expensive jewelry, lets him ride on a beautiful chariot, and makes him the second most powerful man in Egypt. Of course he could interpret dreams, but did his George Clooney looks contribute to his success? It seems likely.

The Bible mentions other extremely good-looking people. Rachel and Esther were both described as being particularly beautiful. The Bible describes King David as red haired with beautiful eyes and a handsome countenance. The good-looking people achieve success. The Talmud sometimes goes even further. Rabbi Johanan used to entrance sit b y the *mikvah* (ritual bath) in the evening. He explained that when the women came out from their immersions and returned to their husbands, they

would have children as beautiful as him. On the other hand, Rabbi Joshua was known to be particularly homely. The daughter of the emperor said, your Torah is stored in such an ugly vessel. Rabbi Joshua responded how wine in an ugly clay jug does not spoil as quickly as wine in beautiful gold and silver vessels.

How important is beauty and ugliness in Jewish tradition? The book of Proverbs when describing a woman of valor, says "Charm is deceitful and beauty is vain" (Proverbs 31:30). For a fuller answer, let us turn to Hanukkah. Hanukkah really began as a civil war between Jews who supported Hellenistic values and Jews who opposed such values. One of the most important Greek values was the worship of beauty. The Greeks and their Jewish supporters wanted to build a gymnasium in Jerusalem where Olympic style athletic contests could take place. Athletes (all male) would compete in the nude, showing the beauty of their bodies. Jewish men, whose bodies had been disfigured by circumcision, could not compete.

Perhaps the best way to describe the disagreement between Hellenistic and Jewish values is with the saying, "To the Greeks beauty is good, to the Jews goodness is beautiful." It is more important to be a good person than a beautiful person. I rarely read the popular magazines dealing with celebrities and their lives. But I remember once reading an article in one such magazine about the beautiful people. It listed which movie stars have the best reputation for being kind people, people who practiced goodness in their day-today lives. Who really treated the ordinary workers on the movie sets, the people who did hair and make-up or brought them coffee, with the most compassion? Who was not simply beautiful but good?

We live in a world which emphasizes beauty. We all want to look like the movie stars, the athletes, the models, the people on magazine covers. And we spend a fortune on plastic surgery, diets, gym memberships, and other products to make us look young and beautiful. Often this quest for beauty is the cause of great depression, particularly among teens. Sadly, it sometimes leads to suicide. The truth is that even the people on magazine covers do not look like that in real life. Pictures are touched up.

Judaism as opposed to Hellenism teaches that goodness, not beauty, is the goal. In fact, if we are to seek beauty at all, it is the beauty of the *mitzvot*. The Bible says "Behold you are beautiful my love" (Song of Songs 4:1). The *Midrash* based on this verse teaches, "You are beautiful in mitzvot, you are beautiful in deeds of loving kindness" (Song of Songs Rabbah 4:1). Perhaps part of the message of Hanuk-







Is Patriotism a Lost Art?

Dear friends,

We were warned! Back in 2007, *Daniel Pipes* * alerted us:

"Western Europe has sprung a fatal leak in its own reservoir of self-esteem. The EU is sinking into a spiral of political selfloathing. Patriotism is dead!".

Europe evidently, according to Pipes, has lost faith in its own history, in its own robust flowering of culture, religion and rich spiritual values. Europe has blotted from its memorybank its own amazing record of high achievement in philosophy, science, medicine, music, art & most important, its acknowledgement of the legitimacy of religious tolerance and its demonstrated capacity to honor the inalienable right of all men to be free.

Really? Re-read the glorious history of Judaism's *Golden Age in Spain* (10th-12th centuries) where and when Jews served in top capacities including Commander-In-Chief of a Spanish/Moslem army!




