From the Desk of Rabbi David Wise <u>No More Living Alone</u>



When he analyzed the geopolitical reality of his time, the prophet Bil'am

had this to say about the new upstart nation known as the Israelites: "There is a people that dwells apart, not reckoned among the nations" (Numbers 23:9). Bil'am was hired by Balak, king of Moav, to curse the Israelites and impede their progress. When Bil'am realized, with divine inspiration, that there was no impeding Israel's progress, he blessed them instead. But in the 21st century, with the Jewish People at perhaps its greatest level of ascendancy in history (sovereign in Israel, successful in many Diaspora communities), we should ponder whether the idea of "a people that dwells apart" is a blessing, or something else?

While I've heard this question raised by others such as Donniel Hartman, it was crystallized when I read Judaism and Other Religions: Models of Understanding, this month's selection for review in The Rabbi's Nightstand. It's written by Alan Brill, an Orthodox rabbi who also happens to be chair of Jewish-Christian Studies at

I would love to share with you some highlights of the beautiful concert I just performed on January 15th in Beverly Hills, California. at the Wilshire Ebell Theatre. It was a concert in honor of Shlomo Carlebach (of blessed memory), who was not only one of my *mentors* but was a friend and one of the most soulful, generous people I have known. The concert actually took place on his Hebrew birthday. It was arranged by one of my students, Cantor Arik Wolheim, who is now the Cantor of Beth Jacob Congregation in Beverly Hills, a very flourishing modern orthodox synagogue. Arik has a beautiful voice and is such a fine & respectful human being, a true mensch. It was a pleasure to see how he is loved by his congregation.

Reb Shlomo Carlebach was a Rabbi, Composer, and Singer who was also known as "The Singing Rabbi". His musical style was unique and filled with warmth. It had a Chassidic undertone and was filled with great *Neshama (soul)* and had a participatory spirit. His music captivates people from all backgrounds, Chassidic, Modern Orthodox, Conservative & Reform. His career spanned 40 years, but was cut short much too soon by his untimely passing. His music & melodies continue to be popular all over the Jewish world today. His music is celebrated on Shabbat & Holidays at the "Carlebach Shul" on the upper west side of Manhattan. I remember, whenever I would meet Shlomo: on the street, at a concert, at a hotel up in the Catskills or anywhere, he would say to me "Mein Bruder...How is the voice? How are the concerts? How is the shul?" He would hug me and kiss me and tell me about all of his happenings. Keep in mind that we were both on the same concert circuit. He sang & composed the same way he loved, with his whole heart & soul.

The concert in Beverly Hills was beautiful! It was with a full symphony orchestra (I think 53 pieces), in a beautiful concert hall (Wilshire Ebell Theatre) which holds about 1200. The concert was sold out and I heard that an additional 150 people were unfortunately turned away with no more seats available. We sang some of Carlebach's most popular melodies and the audience went wild. I was so proud to have been asked to sing one of my own pieces, my Avinu Shebashamayim. I was able to hear the entire audience singing along and the emotion that filled the hall. When I heard the claps & howls at the end of my numbers, I looked up and was overcome with joy when I saw Danny Clivner (our beloved member Mira Clivner's son and

Seton Hall, the Catholic university of New Jersey. In this 2010 book, Rabbi Brill collects an anthology of Biblical, rabbinic, medieval and modern texts about how we are to relate to other faiths and their practitioners. He divides this vast array of texts into categories such as inclusivist, exclusivist, and pluralist. It's fascinating to learn how many classical authorities asserted the legitimacy of other religions. And while this volume focuses on Christianity and Islam, a forthcoming companion work will address other Eastern religions (spoiler alert-Brill hints that Jewish thinkers have been far more accepting of these traditions than I would have expected!).

The key lesson of Brill's research is found in this paragraph in his conclusion. It's worth quoting in its entirety: "In the Middle Ages we did not always dwell alone; rather we adapted to each age. Jewish history is usually portrayed as one of continuous persecution, what Salo Baron called the lachrymose theory. But prior centuries of Jewish life were not continuous persecution. In most countries, Jews embraced the opportunities of their culture from 800 until 1800. Some may know of the Golden Age in Spain, when Jews were political leaders, financiers, and poets. But a comparable situation existed in most regions: North Africa, Italy, Provence, the Ottoman Empire, and Greece. And not just in the eleventh and twelfth until the 1800s. In 1100, 95 percent of world Jewry lived around the Mediterranean Sea or around the Fertile Crescent in security, while in the era of the Crusades, only 5 percent of Jewry lived in Ashkenaz. We spent disproportionate amounts of time envisioning the crusades, and minimal time discussing the periods of social integration, tranquility, and productivity (emphasis added—p. 228).

The tendency to focus on the "lachrymose" that Brill addresses has two negative consequences. The first regards pride in Jewish identity, especially among our younger generations. This was recently expressed creatively and provocatively by Rachel Bloom, creator, writer and star of the Emmy-winning show Crazy Ex-Girlfriend. In a recent episode, Rachel is drawn into the dancing circle at a family Bat-Mitzvah, where Rabbi Shari from Scarsdale (Patti LuPone) and Rachel's mother (Tovah Feldshuh) sing an ode to our lachrymose history: "Now it's time to celebrate/Grab a drink and fix a plate/But before you feel too great/Remember that we suffered. Nights like these are filled with glee/Noshing, dancing, singing, whee!/But we sing in a minor key/To remember that we suffered." Soon, the DJ (who must make public note that his grandma is a survivor) has the whole circle answering his "we" with "suffered." The

look on Rachel's face is priceless—and I'd guess that more young Jews today relate to her than to, say, the Simon Wiesenthal Center. She does not look remotely proud of a Jewish identity defined by suffering.

The second result of our tendency to remember Crusades over creativity plays out in contemporary interfaith dialogue. If what we remember of the Church is 1096, or even Pope Pius XII during the Shoah, we are destined to remain alone; if we consider the enormous strides the Church made in the 1960s with Nostra Aetate, let alone Pope Francis today, we can bring great blessing to the world through Jewish-Christian encounter. The same applies to Islam. ISIL is not its only public face. On MLK Day, at the Heschel School in Manhattan, I was one of 500 people at a conference on Muslim-Jewish relations organized by the Shalom Hartman Institute. There, I heard Imam Abdullah Antepli, the courageous co-founder of the Muslim Leadership Initiative, say that anyone who denies the Jewish claim to a home in the Land of Israel is an anti-Semite. How did he come to this view? By leading a group of American Muslim thought leaders to study Judaism and Zionism in Jerusalem, at Hartman. And so the conversation has begun, and must continue-not so that we will all agree, but so that we can hear

one another's unique and valuable stories.

As Rabbi Brill writes: "It is time for us to put aside the role of a nation of victims that we assumed due to the circumstances of history, and return to the role played by our ancestors Abraham, Isaac and Jacob: heroes of Divine history, called by God to greatness and responsibility" (p. 231). Amen to that!

Rabbi Dr. H. Joseph Simckes Life After Retirement Where Do We Go From

Here...in 2017?!

This past month we commemorated the 31st yahrtzeit of Judith Resnik, America's legendary 2nd female astronaut. Judith perished on 1/28/86 along with six other glorious U.S. "space pioneers" when the NASA shuttle Challenger blew up at 11:39 EST off the Florida coast...73 seconds after take off!

A brilliant, beautiful Jewish girl from Akron, Ohio (she graduated from high school with *a perfect SAT score*!) Judith filled the hearts of her parents, Sarah and Marvin, with justifiable pride and enormous joy. After earning her PHD in electrical engineering at the University of Maryland, Judith continued her studies and professional career at Carnegie Mellon, RCA, NIH and Xerox. Soon she was scooped up by NASA.

Her first space voyage was on the historic Discovery in 1984 as a space specialist, the first American Jewish woman astronaut. Judith's fellow astronauts admired her knowledge, resolute spirit and charm. We continue to celebrate her illustrious, all too brief life and mourn her tragic loss. We share with her bereaved family, friends, fellowastronauts and all our fellow citizens a deep sense of enduring grief and suppressed shock.

Judith Resnik does remain, however, for women everywhere – for young Jewish girls in particular, I suspect – a true model of professional luminescence, a glowing example of heart, mind and body blazing a trail of high achievement.

Over the years, there have been many Jewish women who have left their mark of excellence on the pages of history in the fields of government, law, business, music, art, theater, science, medicine, education... even Biblical literature! The rabbis tell us that it was our matriarch Sarah who understood even more insightfully than her beloved husband, Abraham, that it was through Yitzchak rather than through Yishmael that monotheistic Judaism...and the future of Western civilization and the salvation of mankind... would be assured.

Similarly, the Midrash affirms that only through the righteousness of the Israelite women were our forefathers redeemed from Egypt! David killed Goliath it is true...but it was Yael who slew Siserah!

Women like Judith Resnik and so many amazing women of the past, however, are gone! What precious lessons can we learn from the pain and reality of their loss?

This month we begin a new secular calendar year. We also commence a fresh four year cycle of national governance with a new president and a new team of leaders and policy makers. For many, the outcome of our election may seem something like a funeral, the death of specific political dreams. For others, it seems like a hard won victory for new/old greatness.

For all of us, women and men united in purpose, it is a time of challenge, a time for burying our disappointments, sorrows and grievances, metaphorically "sitting shivah", as it were ...and as soon as possible, moving forward to confront and resolve the critical issues before us all. The recent "stab in the back" by our own government to its most stalwart ally and the only democracy in the anguished Middle East- Israel- is only one of the shameful, impactful issues that we, as responsible citizens will need to address through our elected representatives in Washington.

Failure is not an option. Otherwise, we will have *fired ourselves* from our jobs as responsible citizens! Our job is to learn from our losses and our victories and grow stronger and wiser because of them.

Our Torah-rooted Jewish Tradition (i.e. "Choose life!") and our star spangled American heritage (i.e. "The land of the free and the home of the brave!") urge us to take the path, perhaps less travelled, but for us more enchanting, ultimately more fulfilling, i.e. the path of moral growth, fortitude, forgiveness, courage and faith for at its conclusion there glistens universal liberty, justice, authentic love, sanctity and peace!

That, it seems to me, is where we go from here.
