From the Desk of Rabbi David Wise Six Day War Euphoria



In this month's installment of The Rabbi's Nightstand, let's think back

to 1967, if you're old enough to remember it (I wouldn't arrive on the scene for another year, so I don't have that recall). It's fair to say that 1967 was a watershed year in Jewish history, perhaps even more so than 1948. The Six Day War established Israel as a regional superpower, vastly expanded its territory, and created a new Jewish psyche, one of pride and, one dare say, invincibility.

For all the books I've read about the Six Day War, I was surprised to have even been interested in the latest offering, The Lion's Gate by Steven Pressfield. I would not have ordinarily bought this book, but in curiosity, took a look at the author's credentials. He has written several war-related books, both fiction and non-fiction, though I recognized his The Legend of Bagger Vance, which later became a motion picture success. I did wonder, though, what another book could contribute to our knowledge of the Six Day War. In reading the preface, I saw that Pressfield asked the

Perhaps some of you watched the tribute to the TOP 10 CNN HEROES as June and I did recently. There were 3 "heroes" in particular that caught my attention.

Firstly, I was so proud of the 2 Jewish heroes that were honored. Rabbi Elimelech Goldberg tragically lost his 2 year old daughter to leukemia in 1981 and witnessed the terrible pain many children endure while undergoing medical procedures and treatments. He founded the nonprofit organization, Kids Kicking Cancer. Rabbi Goldberg is a black belt in Choi Kwang-Do himself and his mission is to help children by teaching them how to use martial arts to help manage and ease their pain and fears during treatments.

His group has provided free lessons and support to 5,000 children and their families. *Kol Hakavod* and may *Hashem* give him the health to continue doing *Gemilut Chassadim*.

Dr. Wendy Ross is a Pediatrician specializing in Developmental Behavior Pediatrics. She is the founder of the nonprofit, *Autism Inclusion Resources*, and has helped hundreds of families deal with challenging social and environmental situations, such as airport travel, sports events and simply being in public. As Autism can cause a heightened sensitivity to environmental stimulation, lights, music, the noise of a crowd and traffic can cause a meltdown that is unpredictable. Her organization helps provide training to employees at stadiums, airlines, airports, etc., about autism and how to interact with individuals who have the disorder. May Gd bless Dr. Ross as she continues her remarkable work.

Another wonderful individual is Arthur Bloom. He uses the healing power of music to help hundreds of injured soldiers gain back some happiness in their lives. His program, Musi-Corps, pairs together professional musicians with soldiers recovering at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center, helping them play instruments and even write and record music. Some of the soldiers who have lost limbs sometimes require specialized instruments, which Bloom provides. Arthur Bloom;s mission is to help those injured by war, reclaim some happiness, through the joy of music. By the way, I thought that Arthur Bloom might be Jewish. After all, his name seems like it might be. But after searching the web I could not verify this. If anyone can find this information, please let me know. Then that would make it THREE OF THE TEN CNN heroes that are Jewish.

same question, given that he has more than 100 books about the war on his own shelves. "The answer is I wanted to tell the subjective story, the on-the-ground and inthe-air saga, in a way that I have not seen it told before, even if it meant taking liberties with academic and journalistic conventions."

Pressfield had me shortly after, with these words: "I am a Jew. I wanted to tell the story of this Jewish war, fought by Jews for the preservation of the Jewish nation and the Jewish people. I don't pretend to be impartial. At the same time, I have tried, despite license taken, to tell the story straight" (xi).

Pressfield writes in the firstperson voice of the many veterans he interviewed for the book. As the participants become the storytellers, the reader is taken into their cockpits, half-tracks and tanks in vivid and sometimes graphic terms. We learn about the strategic genius of some of Israel's greatest military heroesespecially Ariel Sharon, who orchestrated the ground operation in Sinai to follow up the destruction of the Egypt's air force in the war's opening act. Danny Matt (who, along with Sharon, died last year), was a brigade commander under Sharon, and described his superior officer's brilliance this way: "I have studied the campaigns of Caesar and Alexander, Hannibal and Napoleon. Believe me, when Sharon one

day joins them, they will save a place for him at the sand table. And they will all listen when he speaks" (p. 231).

It's hard not to read *The Lion's Gate* without considering the aftermath of the Six Day War. It may be that victory came to Israel too easily, and led to the near-fatal debacle of 1973. It left Israel with the complication of occupation which continues to vex us. Yossi Klein Halevi's *Like Dreamers* tells that story of Israel's divided soul beautifully.

So here's where Steven Pressfield has captured this reader: knowing all that I do about what will happen after 1967, when I read this book, I am frozen in time. I don't need to worry about what the future will bring; I need only worry for the safety of the soldiers whose stories I read. They are Jews; the author is a Jew. For six short days, we were one. Even if we weren't born yet.

<u>Ohr Chadash News</u>

The Write Stuff

The Torah is our light and the length of our days. But how exactly is a Torah created? How long does it take to write one? What if you make a mistake? What makes a Torah kosher or pasul?

All these and other fascinating questions were answered for our students by Rabbi Gustavo Surazski of Ashkelon's Kehillat Netzach Israel Synagogue on Sunday morning, November 23, 2014, at a special Sofer Program held at Israel Center of Conservative Judaism.

Rabbi Surazski is the brother of Silvia Kogan, who made the day's event possible, and the brother-in-law of Rabbi Manes Kogan of Hillcrest Jewish Center. He was gracious enough to share his expertise as a sofer, or scribe, with the students, staff, and parents of our school and enlighten us as to what is involved in producing a Torah. The parchment upon which a Torah is written is made from kosher animal skin, ranging from sheep, to deer, to goat. The ink which is utilized must also be kosher and the writing implement used is a quill from a kosher bird, often a turkey. A Torah consists of sixty-three panels, which are sewn together with animal sinew. If a mistake is made in a word or a letter is drawn wrong, there is a means by which the ink can be lifted off the parchment and redone correctly. However, if

there is a mistake in the writing of God's name, the panel must be removed and buried since it is forbidden to erase God's name.

It takes Rabbi Surazski approximately twelve months to pen an entire Torah. With modern technologically, a computer is used to scan the document to make certain there are no errors. This gives the sofer an extra assurance that the Torah is perfect. Although a Torah is spiritually priceless, physically it has a price and the monetary value can vary by thousands of dollars. It must be remembered that a sofer dedicates at least a year of his or her life to creating a work of perfection, which makes it so costly.

At the program, every child was given a piece of specially lined paper and shown how to write letters as they are inscribed in the Torah. At the conclusion of the program, everyone thanked Rabbi Surazski for teaching us about this unique form of religious calligraphy. We were also able to thank the rabbi in another way, for it is the children of Rabbi Surazski's synagogue in Ashkelon who are the recipients of our "Turn Halloween

Rabbi Dr. H. Joseph Simckes Life After Retirement

<u>Time is a Four-Letter Word</u> (Part One)

Time is a crazy if not crazymaking subject. Ask any admitting officer in a New York psychiatric facility: What is the first question put to any walk-in "client"(after the usual, "What is your name?")?

Answer: "What is today's date?"

Nu? Do you think half the drunks, drug addicts, neurotics, schizophrenics, etc. who daily grace the admitting offices will give you a straight answer? When I was working in the Massachusetts Mental Health Center in Boston years ago, one of the more frequent responses was *"I am the Messiah! I am beyond time!"*.

Where do you go from there? To put the question of time into a more personal context, consider this: Does anyone really know the exact date of his/her own birthday? Are you sure? Were you there as a cognizant witness of your own birth? Or, like most of us, are you not actually dependent upon some often impossible-to- locate hospital (now closed!) whose records are sealed, lost or untrustworthy?

My own mother, of blessed memory, told me in her 90th year that her birthday was not on November 29th as our entire family had always believed but on November 9th! As a new immigrant from Czarist Russia in the early 1900's, she- like many of her Jewish, Yiddish-speaking peers in Brooklyn believed that "number 9" was an evil number, a "siman ra!, i.e. bad luck". Every student of Jewish numerology knew that! After all, it was on the 9th of Av that our Holy Temple in Jerusalem was destroyed - twice in fact!!

Her father, an internationally revered Rabbi, Talmud scholar and Kabbalist, agreed. Therefore, she told her public school teachers that she was born 20 days later. So was it written and so was it legally inscribed in New York City official records: she was born on the 29th of November. But the reality was otherwise!

The examples of mistaken or scrambled record-keeping about time and personal identity are legion.

On a deeper, more philosophical level, who has not asked himself/ herself (as a child or as a selfseeking young adolescent), "Who am I ? Where do I come from? Where do we all come from? Is our planet the only source of living creatures? How do we measure time and space anyway?" Do you really think that Albert Einstein was the first and only person to wonder about such things? Not so.

In ancient Mesopotamia- over 2000 years ago!- the locals conceived of time as an everlastingly turning wheel. In the middle of March- around the vernal equinox - they celebrated what they considered the beginning of the latest cycle of the Eternal wheel of Time, i.e. in that particular "year". They marked that occasion with formal ceremonies including songs, ritual chants and chilling blood ceremonies, i.e sacrifices!

The ancient Mayans had their own ideas. Their methods of con-

fronting and appeasing the mysterious forces which they believed governed time and space - as well as man's role within those universal dimensions – were, to us moderns, similarly shocking. Check the internet for the gory details.

The Chinese, thanks to Shun, their mythological emperor, who lived over 4000 years ago, follow a 12 month lunar calendar. They celebrate their New Year on the 23rd day of their last lunar month, an amazing holiday which lasted for 23 days "ending on the 15th day of their first lunar month the following year". They know how to celebrate! With fireworks, drums, gongs, "good luck" money gifts to kids, dragon and lion dances in the streets...Kids, aren't you sorry you were not born in Beijing!

The almost two billion or so Moslems alive today are definitely not sorry they were not born in Beijing. They are proudly committed to follow a very different method of measuring time. They use a calendar, also lunar, but much "younger" than the one used by the Chinese, extending back in time only 1393 years- to 622 C.E., the year when Muhammed fled from Mecca to Medina. Their celebrations are dedicated to their own sense of time, place and religious identity.

How do we Jews and our Christian neighbors welcome the New Year? Check out the details – and differences!- in next month's Dateline, ok?

will distribute them on Purim night, March 4th, after the Megillah reading. Come join us in helping make everybody's Purim a happy one.






