From the Desk of Rabbi David Wise The Ghetto of Venice



By the time you receive this summer edition of *Dateline*, I will have concluded a

brief visit to Italy, including Shabbat in Venice. So in this month's installment of *The Rabbi's Nightstand*, I want to remind us that if we are fortunate enough to travel, it's good to do homework in advance. More than 25 years ago, as a gift for staffing a USY event, I was given a gift that sat on my bookshelf ever since: *The Ghetto of Venice* by Riccardo Calimani. Apparently, it's never too late to read a book longago acquired!

Written originally in Italian in 1985, Calimani's history of this prominent Jewish community covers the history, the politics of religion, the culture and traditions of Venetian Jewry. The ghetto was home to Jews from different countries of origin, and eventually came to be a prominent destination for refugees from Spain. While the term "ghetto" does not evoke positive thoughts in the aftermath of the Shoah, in the centuries of its heyday, Venice was home to one of most tolerated Jewish

I would like to share with all of you the beautiful moment I recently experienced at the Cantors Assembly Convention a few weeks ago, which took place in West Palm Beach, Florida. Although we were right near the beach, we stayed indoors, going from session to session, filled with music, interesting lectures, tradition and friendship. We were about 150 Cantors from all over the country. Each night there was a musical event and the last night of the convention they held a concert at Temple Emanu-El of Palm Beach where my friend David Feuer is the Cantor. It was a Musical Tribute to Israel at 70. As they were about to begin the concert, I suddenly felt everyone's eyes turn to look at me. I could not understand what was going on. "What did I do?" There were about 500 people plus 150 Cantors in the sanctuary and everyone turned their face toward me. Then I heard the music start playing the opening to my Avinu Shebashamayim. The entire audience sang together with the Cantor & Choir on stage. What an emotional moment for me. It warmed my heart and soul! So many things were going through my mind. I was thinking of our beloved State of Israel, the collective beautiful voices

singing the poignant words of this prayer. It was a precious moment that touched everyone. When the piece was over, they respectfully acknowledged and thanked me for bringing this music to the Jewish world. I had tears streaming down my cheek.

I want to thank you, my beloved congregation. As I always tell you, whenever I write a piece of liturgical music, I always sing it in our shul first. I try to sense how you receive it and how easy it would be for congregants o learn it. When I see you tap your feet or sway from side to side and sing along...I know it's time to present it to the rest of the Jewish world. Thank you for being by my side!

I want to give a shout-out to all who joined my Learn to Lead Services class. We had so much fun and I am so proud of all of you. Great Job! We will be continuing our Learn to Lead Services class in the Fall.

By the way...I am not sure how many of you had the chance to watch the Tony Awards. June and I watched much of it, since we heard there were going to be a number of Jewish nominees. I was so proud to see so many of our people up for a Tony and I was also thrilled to hear about so many of our fellow Jews who are very well respected and successful in the Broadway/Musical world. communities in the Christian Middle Ages.

One story in particular caught my attention as I read, leading me to compare and contrast our lives in our American Diaspora with the lives of Jews who lived in the shadow of The Inquisition. It's the story of Samuel Aboab, who served as a rabbi in Venice beginning in 1650. He had the enormous challenge of mediating grave communal tensions in the 1660s, as the messianic fervor surrounding the claims of Shabbtai Tzvi rocked Venetian Jewry. The lay leaders wanted to embrace the messianic hope; the rabbis sought to suppress it. Rabbi Aboab tried to stake out a middle ground. For example, the lay leaders insisted on mass acts of penitence (in a city that was generally festive) to prepare for salvation; most rabbinic authorities objected. Aboab himself didn't believe in Shabbtai Tzvi's self-declared status, but he refused to commit in either direction. His primary goal was to maintain calm, not only because he feared a divided community of Jews, but also because zeal "was dangerous and could provoke an adverse reaction on the part of curious and irritated Gentiles" (p. 214). A proclamation expressing his concerns called for "silence, discretion with the Christians. and time to reflect" (215). But he well knew that this was an all-consuming concern for the Jews of the ghetto, and there

was no way they would keep silent.

Even after news arrived that Shabbtai Tzvi had converted to Islam to save his neck, the Jews of Venice remained in turmoil, especially when the false messiah's prophet, Nathan of Gaza, arrived in Venice, prompting great debate over whether he should be welcomed to the ghetto. Eventually, the community rabbis agreed to meet with Nathan, and found him to be a charlatan, but in some ways it was too late. Many in the community were devastated at having been misled.

As I contemplate this bizarre event in Jewish history, I think about Rabbi Aboab's goal of keeping the community together despite their vastly differing opinions about messianic fervor. It seems that despite his best efforts to put the genie

back in the bottle, he was no more successful than his hardline colleagues at convincing the laity that Shabbtai was a fraud. Though the episode is an example of conflict between extreme positions, it raises an interesting question: when should a leader seek to mediate for the sake of communal harmony, and when should s/ he take a stand and declare that there is only one legitimate approach? As Rabbi Aboab learned, the middle is a lonely place. Could he have been more effective if he had acted on his convictions? This is an age-old question in the study of leadership, and it remains relevant today. What do you think?

Rabbi Dr. H. Joseph Simckes Life After Retirement <u>"The Wandering Jew"</u> <u>An Outmoded</u> Conceptual Model

Ever since the first Hebrew, our Patriarchal Father, Abraham, who was pre-eminently identified as a glorious wanderer, a bold adventurer prepared to leave everything dear and precious behind him - his original home, his land, his familiar country-side, his culture, his value-system, his friends, his entire life-style - to follow an unseen Voice in pursuit of a momentously new and different future, rife with uncertainty and unknown dangers, he and his progeny have been associated in the popular imagination with steroidal energy outside the normal gravitational framework of time and place.

Indeed, his designation as "*ha-lvri*" denotes one who is by nature not stationary but rather one who does "*cross over*"(that is the translation of the original Hebrew verb "*Oveir*"), whether the Tigris or Euphrates River or any hurdle or restricting barrier in pursuit of extraordinary goals.

In citing our Jewish pre-history, as recorded in one of our foundational religious texts, the Passover Haggadah, we Jews see ourselves as blessed with a peculiar historical DNA, a genetic factor that gifts or goads us into coalescing into a travelling, evolving religious civilization . The Haggadah states, "Arami Oved Avi" i.e. "My father was a Wandering Aramean!" We saw ourselves as a people in perpetual motion.

Over the centuries, this conceptual model was in fact accurate. Vicious historical circumstances – pillage, oppression and brutal discrimination - often followed our ancestors' peregrinations. *Wandering* became a necessary *Survival Tool*. Jews demonstrated an amazing power. Individually and communally we were able to leap through and over the flames of devastation in one location only to land on our feet in another, constantly reinventing ourselves with renewed vigor & stunning success in each new locale.

Ashkenazi Jews were wont to exclaim, "Oy, es iz schver tzu zein a Yid!" i.e. "It's tough to be a Jew, the burden is truly heavy!" Right? On the other hand, wherever we Jews established ourselves, we left a trail of high achievement - in Babylonia, Spain, Portugal, Morocco, Central Europe, England, Poland, The New World, etc.

In our own generation, following the horrors of the Holocaust, multitudes of Jews have chosen to return to Zion, our ancient Land of Milk and Honey, reasserting political sovereignty, building new lives of joyous reinvention in the Promised Holy Land. Proudly, however, they no longer conceived themselves as escaping *Wanderers* but rather as sons and daughters *Returning* to their own homes!

Chana and I are now among these contemporary *Jewish "Returners"* to the Land of Israel. We leave behind us a glorious land, *America*, unique, blessed, generous, creative, compassionate, free, bold, the likes of which has never been seen before on our planet. A land we love and cherish now and always, a land filled with marvelous friends, deeply beloved family members, magnificent religious and educational institutions, profound principles ...and countless sweet, sweet memories!

Truth be told, as Chana and I confront our "golden years", the magnetic pull of our children and their spouses, seven grandchildren and my younger brother now living in *Medinat Yisrael*, is very powerful. Too powerful for us to resist. We see ourselves in Israel not as "*Eternal Jewish Wanderers*", but as fortunate "*Returners*" to our ancient home and a sanctified life, surrounded by glorious *Wonder*, drenched in daily miracles. Challenging, yes, but uniquely fulfilling.

I shall attempt to describe and share with you, my beloved family and friends who abide in the "Goldeneh Medinah", America, some of the breath-taking and soul-enlarging details of life in contemporary Israel in the months ahead. You are invited to visit us and see for yourselves the astonishing existential reality of Am Yisrael robustly striving – and in many ways, amazingly thriving! – in Eretz Yisrael according to Torat Yisrael.

G-D BLESS US ALL ...both in the "Geulah" i.e. ISRAEL, and the "Golah" i.e. AMERICA !!


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
