From the Desk of Rabbi David Wise You Are What You Read?



Do you have your summer reading list yet? As you decide what to

read at the pool club, on vacation, or one summer evening while watching the sunset, you'll probably be sending a message about who you are and what makes life meaningful for you. In this issue of The Rabbi's Nightstand, let's explore the idea that what we read is an extension of who we are (we are what we read, if you will). Part of the reading experience for me is the act of seeking books, and what I look for and where are key pieces of evidence for anyone looking to understand me.

My general approach to reading for pleasure is to make sure that I continue to nourish my mind, heart and soul in the areas which I like most—Judaism, sports, and history. I rotate my selections among these three areas, with the occasional science-related volume mixed in. A recent sample of books shows that attempt to balance interests: *Putting God Second* by Donniel Hartman and *Akiva* by Reuven Hammer fed my Judaica cravings; *All*

the Shah's Men by Stephen Kinzer and The Only Woman in the Room by Beate Sirota Gordon were the history selections; The Last Great Game by Gene Wojciechowski and Keon and Me by Dave Bidini kept me engaged in sports fandom. Anyone who wants to know what interests me most can look at that list and answer with ease.

It's also worth noting that the way I acquired these books is a window into my life. Three example will suffice. I bought All the Shah's Men for \$2 at the overflow book bazaar at the library in Kent, Connecticut. Kent is one of the closest towns to Camp Ramah in the Berkshires. This summer, as I have the previous five, I will spend a month teaching Torah to Jewish campers ages 8-16. I always make sure to get to Kent, usually on erev Shabbat, to hunt for bargain books and enjoy a taste of New England. As you've heard me say many times, Camp Ramah is core to my identity as a Jew, and the single most successful initiative of Conservative Judaism. Finding books nearby is a bonus!

Keon and Me is one of a number of books I've bought on my annual visits to my mother in Toronto. Though I've lived in the New York area for more than half my life, I solidify my roots and address cultural longings by buying and reading uniquely Canadian books. That could be done by buying a book about the Quebec provin-

cial referendum on sovereignty, or biographies of musicians such as Gordon Lightfoot and Joni Mitchell, or, most commonly, books about hockey. I didn't even know about *Keon and Me* until I saw it on the shelf at Chapters, the Barnes and Noble of the north. Yes, it's about growing up a fan of the Maple Leafs. Yes, that's a large part of my identity as well.

Finally, The Only Woman in the Room was lent to me by a friend—it's a cousin's memoir. The author was involved in drafting Japan's post-war constitution, responsible for sections on education and women's rights. In the process of advocating for her work, she was, as the title states, surrounded entirely by men. It's a lively memoir about an exciting life; but more than that, it's a window into my friend's extended family. How well do we know the backstory of our friends, let alone their relatives, people we'd probably never meet? Reading this book was a new way to connect with someone I knew, but now know better. Knowledge is great; relationships are better!

So again, what are you reading this summer, and why? Where did you get the book? Use the summer to read, but also to ponder the question: who am I? What matters most to me? How do my actions—including reading—express my values and priorities? Not long after summer ends, we'll need to take an accounting of our-

selves—heshbon hanefesh on the High Holy Days. Make your summer reading an early start to that sacred practice!

Ohr Chadash News

How Quickly This Year Has Flown By Ruth Merrill Education Director

By the time you read this update of the end of the year, the children will have received their report cards, said good bye to teachers and Ohr Chadash friends and the school will be packed up and preparing to transfer to our location for September.

April was a very busy month with each class learning the laws, rituals and wonderful songs associated with Pesach. On Sunday, April 10th, twentytwo children, from Gan-Katan, Shorashim and Mechina and their parents visited the Bay Terrace Chabad Matzah Bakery. Rabbis from Chabad acted out the story of the Exodus from Egypt and also demonstrated the special care and speed with which Shemurah Matzah is prepared and baked. Each student made their own Matzah to nosh on the way home and received a prepackaged Israeli Shemurah Matzah for use at their family seder.

Not to be outdone, on Sunday, April 17, the children Kitot Aleph-Gesher participated in their own pre-Pesach Seder. Each class prepared a different part of the Seder and explained its importance to the invited guests. Parents, grandparents and the students of Mechina joined as guests and drank four cups of grape juice, ate celery, matzah, maror and charoset

and enjoyed a festive meal of fish and macaroons. The seder concluded with rousing competing, Hebrew and English renditions of Echad Me Yodayah—Who Knows One.

Following a more than two week break, students and teachers returned to school well fed and even better rested, ready for a month full of activity. Over twenty students participated in the May 4th community wide Yom HaShoah commemoration. Children from Kitot, Gimel, Dalet and Hey read poems written by children during the Holocaust. It was a very moving and highly emotional experience for the participants and the audience.

With great joy and anticipation, the students of Kitah Aleph received their own Siddurim on Sunday, May 15th. With warm remarks from the Rabbis and members of the various boards we were all reminded how im-

"Two-Gun Cohen"... A True Story

Moisheh Avraham Cohen was born in London's East End to poor Polish immigrants. Unfortunately, contrary to their expectations and parental pleadings, young Moisheh "hung out" with some nasty local "friends". Soon enough he was known to the local constabulary as a very skillful pickpocket! Resolute in his anti-authoritarian ways, Moisheh then successfully flunked out of reform school. Desperate, his heart-broken orthodox Jewish parents then sent their tough, recalcitrant son far, far away from his toxic pals...to family members in Saskatchwan, Canada.

Good parental idea, yes? But not good enough, it seems. Muscle-bound Moisheh soon found employment on the newly expanding Canadian national railroad. His innate "yiddesheh hartz", however, sensitized and compelled him to reach out & stand up for the exploited Chinese laborers employed there. Moisheh-the-shtarkeh soon became the Jewish protector and clever advisor of the local Asians

When the fiery, revolutionary, Dr. Sun Yat-Sen, came to Canada to recruit Chinese expats to return to their homeland to help fulfill the dream of creating an independent China, Moishe and Dr. Yat-sen bonded. Dr. Sen found an eager, resourceful ally

in his new Caucasian, freedomand-justice loving friend.

Moisheh returned with Yat-Sen to China as body guard. As Chayim Solomon served George Washington of old, so Moisheh Cohen served Sun Yat-Sen, the Chinese revolutionary, raising funds and expanding circles of support. Ere long, he was promoted to aide-de-camp. He carried a revolver in a shoulder holster and a Smith & Wesson on his hip.

"Two-gun Cohen" rose in the ranks to become "Mah Run" or "General Mah", respected by the Chinese in Taipei and Beijing. When Zionist revolutionaries in Europe and in the Middle East were seeking aid, Moisheh urged his now powerful mentor and friend, Dr. Yat-Sen, to send the European Zionists a signed document which affirmed that the Chinese People were wholeheartedly in favor of their Zionist efforts "to restore your wonderful and historical nation which has contributed so much to the civilization of the world and which rightly deserves an honorable place in the family of nations."

When Chiang Kai-Shek succeeded Yat-Sen, "Two-Gun Cohen" was elected to the rank of General, becoming "not only the first Jew but the first person of European origin to hold such a post in the Chinese military. (Check the reports of the noteworthy Rabbi Marvin Tokayer.) In effect, he served as the Chinese War Minister against the Communists!

After Cohen's retirement in Montreal, he was called back to

serve the interests of the Jewish people by Rabbi Israel Goldstein. The U.N. Security Council meeting in San Francisco at that time was deadlocked, stalemated on the question of granting the right of international recognition to a newly-reborn Jewish state in the former British Mandate of Palestine.

"Two-Gun Cohen" flew to California to meet with General Wu, the leader of the Chinese delegation, holding the key, deciding vote. As it happened, Cohen – or "Mah Run" as he was known in Chinese circles - had originally appointed Wu as general back home in China!

The rest, as they say, is history: defying the enormous negative pressure in the U.N. by the Arab representatives and their European cohorts, the Chinese delegation to the Security Council held firm and "diplomatically" abstained". The result? The reborn State of Israel was given an international pre-natal "brit", a covenant of blessing, as it were, welcoming it into what Yat -Sen had earlier called, "an honorable place in the family of nations."

So, dear friends, members of the League of Distressed Parents, if you have a friend whose heart is breaking, due to a stubborn or difficult child, tell them to hold on! Have faith! Good seeds have the power to ultimately blossom, shed their thorns and bring blessings to the world... and pride to their parents!
