#### From the Desk of Rabbi David Wise Survivor Cafe



"Sometimes when I ask Holocaust survivors to tell me their stories, I

notice them flinch at the word. It's as though 'story' implies something invented, a fairy tale, a parent at bedtime offering make-believe to a sleepy child. One woman puts the word in quotation marks when she sends me an email reply to my question, explaining that she has something to say but she knows there are so many others with 'stories' to tell."

This is but one of hundreds of poignant observations of varying length in Elizabeth Rosner's deeply moving 2017 book, Survivor Café: The Legacy of Trauma and the Labyrinth of Memory. I read it in the days leading up to Yom HaShoah, and I want to draw your attention to it in this edition of The Rabbi's Nightstand. Rosner, a novelist and daughter of two Shoah survivors, organizes her first nonfiction book around three visits with her father to Buchenwald.

As the number of survivors dwindles, Rosner confronts critical questions. How do we carry these "stories" forward? How do we ensure that the hor-

We recently commemorated Yom Hashoah and as we remember and honor the six million who were murdered by the hands of the Nazis, we say NEVER AGAIN! It is now becoming abundantly clear that what we thought would never happen in the United States is indeed happening. Sadly and frighteningly, anti-Semitism is now at a near-historic high level here in the U.S. We must all come together and act on our words "NEVER AGAIN". We must do everything in our power to stop this virus from spreading and at the same time, we must protect ourselves.

We stand together with the Tree of Life–Or L'Simcha Congregations in Pittsburgh, PA and the Chabad of Poway, CA and with all the other victims of anti-Semitic acts and rhetoric across America and throughout the world.

We at HHBJC are taking proactive steps to keep everyone protected. Our shul has created a *Security Committee*, headed up and under the direction of *BOB FOGEL*. The committee is working on many different areas and forms of security and they are arranging meetings to guide and teach us how to be prepared and what action to take in case of, God forbid, an emergency. Everyone needs to stay aware and vigilant at all times. We are looking for more volunteers to join the committee. Please call the synagogue office if you can join. Thank you & Yasher *Koach* Bob, for this initiative. You and your committee are fantastic and are truly covering so many aspects of security & protection for our congregation.

There are other things we can all do. We must contact our government representatives of all levels; community level, borough level, city level, state level and federal level. rors of the past are not forgotten? She notes that one way memory is perpetuated is found in brain research-for there is mounting evidence that trauma is an intergenerational, genetic inheritance. She finds it fitting that *Pesah* is observed in close proximity to the date where the liberation of Buchenwald is commemorated: "This annual ritual [of reciting the Haggadah] has been practiced for centuries—long before we knew that even without the narrative repetition, the past would be transmitted through our cells, our DNA" (p. 9)

Despite her perspective as a child of Shoah survivors, she does not limit her focus to her People's recent trauma alone. She explores the echoes of similar legacies among descendants of African-American slaves, Cambodian survivors of the Killing Fields, of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, and the ongoing effects of 9/11 on the general population. Rosner identifies with her family's particular story, while opening our eyes to the impact of any human trauma on memory.

The book's title is taken from an interesting ritual she witnessed on one of the Buchenwald visits. Around the day where the liberation is commemorated, survivors are scheduled to sit at tables in the halls of the State Theatre in Weimar, Germany, and current residents of Weimar are encouraged to sit with them and converse—victims with descendants of the perpetrators. As Rosner hears one such German woman talk about her shameful family tree, the author reflects: "Her words enter me in a physical way. I feel the accident of her being born to carry what she must carry, and the equally accidental fact of my own birthright. She is a therapist trying to help heal the wounds of history, and I am a writer trying to do the same" (p. 21)

"Stories" are "the S-word," the limitations placed on conveying memory through words, which is what an author tries to do. Here's one final reflection about "stories," "words," and "roots," from Rosner about Buchenwald, which is German for "Beech Forest:"

"Whatever we might live through, separately or together, we eventually bump against the limits of language, its inadequacies and inaccuracies. After all, how could these nebulous boundaries between fact and fiction be made any more precise by words? In the zones of confusion where memory and imagination intersect, where they diverge, maybe our shared vocabulary resides most fully in the vast network of roots that sing beneath our feet, among the intricate branches rising above our heads" (p. 62)

*Survivor Café* is a beautiful book. You won't forget it.

The structure from the outside is commonplace. Yet the sanctuary is like no other with its bimah in front of a wall reminiscent of the ancient walls in Israel. The stained glass windows commemorating biblical events have impressed our many visitors for more than half a century of the building's existence.

On the synagogue wall are numerous plaques which serve as reminders of the families which have celebrated their joyous occasions and marked their sad losses. How many were the years that our congregatoin celebrated the Holy Days with dual services "upstairs and downstairs"? How can one forget the excitement of the Hebrew School children?

Which one of us cannot remember the Bar or Bat Mitzvah or Aufruf or other simchas that his or her family celebrated in our shul.

How can one forget the time that this writer, after saying Kaddish for his father one morning, heard the sound of fire engines some forty-five minutes after leaving the shul. It was later in the day that he learned that shortly after the morning minyan gardeners who had been digging in the ground in front of our shul cut a gas line causing a gas leak. The Fire Department immediately responded. Firemen entered the building and went to the lower level to turn off the gas. As one fireman approached the leaking gas pipe there was a tremendous explosion which blew him across the room. When Rabbi Hertzberg visited him in the hospital the fireman said "Your Jewish G\_d must be powerful. He saved my life".

Although the shul is just a building made of bricks and material things lasting but a limited time, our memories of the joys, celebrations, and friendships that G\_d has bestowed upon us through the shul will remain with us for a lifetime and shared with our progeny.

As depicted in the final scene in "Fidder on the Roof" it is time to move on!

#### Rabbi Dr. H. Joseph Simckes Life After Retirement

#### <u>To All Jewish Parents</u> (Especially, to Moms and Dads of Stubborn, Spoiled, Naughty <u>Kids!)...A Comforting Word!</u> <u>"Two-Gun Cohen"...</u> <u>A True Story</u>

Moisheh Avraham Cohen was born in London's East End to poor Polish immigrants. Unfortunately, contrary to their expectations and parental pleadings, young Moisheh "hung out" with some nasty local "friends". Soon enough he was known to the local constabulary as a very skillful pickpocket! Resolute in his anti-authoritarian ways, Moisheh then successfully flunked out of reform school. Desperate, his heart-broken orthodox Jewish parents then sent their tough, recalcitrant son far, far away from his toxic pals...to family members in Saskatchwan, Canada.

Good parental idea, yes? But not good enough, it seems. Muscle-bound Moisheh soon found employment on the newly expanding Canadian national railroad. His innate "yiddesheh hartz", however, sensitized and compelled him to reach out & stand up for the exploited Chinese laborers employed there. Moisheh-the-shtarkeh soon became the Jewish protector and clever advisor of the local Asians

When the fiery, revolutionary, Dr. Sun Yat-Sen, came to Canada to recruit Chinese expats to return to their homeland to help fulfill the dream of creating an independent China, Moishe and Dr. Yat-sen bonded. Dr. Sen found an eager, resourceful ally in his new Caucasian, freedomand-justice loving friend.

Moisheh returned with Yat-Sen to China as body guard. As Chayim Solomon served George Washington of old, so Moisheh Cohen served Sun Yat-Sen, the Chinese revolutionary, raising funds and expanding circles of support. Ere long, he was promoted to aide-de-camp. He carried a revolver in a shoulder holster and a Smith & Wesson on his hip.

"Two-gun Cohen" rose in the ranks to become "Mah Run" or "General Mah", respected by the Chinese in Taipei and Beijing. When Zionist revolutionaries in Europe and in the Middle East were seeking aid, Moisheh urged his now powerful mentor and friend, Dr. Yat-Sen, to send the European Zionists a signed document which affirmed that the Chinese People were wholeheartedly in favor of their Zionist efforts "to restore your wonderful and historical nation which has contributed so much to the civilization of the world and which rightly deserves an honorable place in the family of nations."

When Chiang Kai-Shek succeeded Yat-Sen, "Two-Gun Cohen" was elected to the rank of General, becoming "not only the first Jew but the first person of European origin to hold such a post in the Chinese military. (Check the reports of the noteworthy Rabbi Marvin Tokayer.) In effect, he served as the Chinese War Minister against the Communists!

After Cohen's retirement in Montreal, he was called back to 15

serve the interests of the Jewish people by Rabbi Israel Goldstein. The U.N. Security Council meeting in San Francisco at that time was deadlocked, stalemated on the question of granting the right of international recognition to a newly-reborn Jewish state in the former British Mandate of Palestine.

"Two-Gun Cohen" flew to California to meet with General Wu, the leader of the Chinese delegation, holding the key, deciding vote. As it happened, Cohen – or "Mah Run" as he was known in Chinese circles - had originally appointed Wu as general back home in China!


The rest, as they say, is history: defying the enormous negative pressure in the U.N. by the Arab representatives and their European cohorts, the Chinese delegation to the Security Council held firm and "diplomatically" abstained". The result? The reborn State of Israel was given an international pre-natal "brit", a covenant of blessing, as it were, welcoming it into what Yat -Sen had earlier called, "an honorable place in the family of nations."

So, dear friends, members of the League of Distressed Parents, if you have a friend whose heart is breaking, due to a stubborn or difficult child, tell them to hold on! Have faith! Good seeds have the power to ultimately blossom, shed their thorns and bring blessings to the world...and pride to their parents!


