

From the Desk of Rabbi David Wise My Son the Parody Singer



I'm not very good at it, but it's a once-ayear dream that Purim

enables me to actualize. My inspiration in this hobby is the late Allan Sherman, whose biography, *Overweight Sensation*, is the subject of this month's installment of The Rabbi's Nightstand.

My parents force-fed me My Son the Folk Singer at an early age, and I was under the assumption that these songs were Jewish. "My Zelda/She took de money and ran with the tailor/(members of Hadassah)." Little did I know that the island that birthed this song wasn't City Island. Didn't all brave knights have names like Sir Greenbaum? Hymns of garment workers and seltzer delivery boys were universal, no? Nu? You can imagine the shock-the feelings of dismay—when I learned that "God Bless You Jerry Mandelbaum" was set to Christmas music. Or that Harry Lewis' brave sacrifice in service of the drapes of Roth wasn't the original subject of Battle Hymn of the Republic.

And so my love of parody music was born. What I didn't appreciate until much later was Sherman's brilliant appropriation of American cultural motifs and injecting them with Jewish

content. In *Overweight Sensation*, author Mark Cohen gets behind the music (VH1, are you reading this?) and credits Sherman with bringing the American Jewish experience to the mainstream. Cohen posits that Sherman's turbulent childhood was caused by a mother who sought to forget her Jewishness, and anchored by grandparents who wore theirs proudly. So Sherman chose to honor his roots, not bury them.

"Sherman's parodies were a cultural breakthrough as well as comic masterpieces. He jostled American culture off its high horse and made it mingle with those who had recently arrived in steerage, giving a voice to Americans that had been too embarrassed to call attention to themselves. They spoke offkilter English, worked low-class jobs, had large, unruly families and were crazy for bargain merchandise. This, too, was part of Sherman's appeal to the many non-Jewish buyers who made the album a national sensation. Their parents also spoke nonstandard English and struggled to make a buck. Sherman's acceptance by a broad array of Americans was unexpected, but it is a hallmark of the Jewish experience in America to be the exemplar of national trends." (pp. 140-141)

The heroine of the Purim story, Esther, is probably named for the ancient Near East goddess Ishtar. But when you Hebraize her name to Esther, her name implies hiddenness. At first, Esther allows her Jewishness

to fly under the radar. But when Uncle Mordechai challenges her to save her doomed people, she steps forward. "If your Majesty will do me the favor, and if it pleases your Majesty, let my life be granted me as my wish, and my people as my request. For we have been sold, my people and I, to be destroyed, massacred, and exterminated..." (Esther 7:3-4a).

What are the landmark holidays when we identify publically as Jews and bring our uniqueness into the full view of America? When we take days off for the High Holy Days, or when we put candles in our windows for Hanukkah, or when we show up at work with matzah. Purim begs us to make like Esther, or Allan Sherman, and sing (and dress in costume) just as proudly. If Jews are disproportionately represented in the American comedy scene, maybe that's the Purim spirit on display. Be an exemplar of a national trend! I, for one, will be inspired to write a parody song in celebration.

Wishing you *Simhat Purim*—happy Purim! Rabbi David Wise

January 2015 marked the 70th Anniversary of the Liberation of Auschwitz/Birkenau. It seems so far back, yet, in reality it is very recent. Around 300 survivors of the Nazi concentration/ death camp returned to the horrific site in Poland to mark this special anniversary of their liberation. Many of them came wearing some form of the notorious stripes of their death camp uniforms. They made them into scarves or sashes with some putting their prisoner numbers on the cloth. Several world leaders attended the ceremonies as did prominent activists, such as the director Steven Spielberg. Many representatives from the World Jewish Congress attended, headed by Ronald S. Lauder.

I watched the ceremonies on JLTV (Jewish Life TV) and was so incredibly touched by the extraordinary strength & courage of the survivors to not only be there but to speak about their experiences and their very serious concerns about the current anti-Semitism and terrorist activities going on throughout the world. They are adamant when they say **NEVER AGAIN** and **NEVER FORGET**. After all, they are worried that when they are no longer here and able to

testify and bear witness, the world will forget. NEVER FOR-GET is their request to all of us. We must continue teaching our children and our grandchildren, we must continue the dialogue with our neighbors, community members and friends and we must make sure that schools always include Holocaust studies in their curriculum. This is how we can honor those who perished in the Shoah as well as those who survived and this is how we can ensure it does not happen again!

We must also do whatever we can to make sure that Jewish Culture, Jewish Life, Jewish Tradition, Jewish communities, Synagogues, Organizations & Schools flourish and remain strong and vibrant for generations to come. AM YISRAEL CHAI - NEVER FORGET - NEVER AGAIN!

Young leaders of the synagogue conducted an informative Junior Congregation, after which the youngsters moved to the Main Sanctuary for the conclusion of the services. The congregation provided a lovely sit down kiddush for the Ohr Chadash families, which beautifully complemented a quite enjoyable morning.

In mid-January we regretfully bid farewell to Israel Center of Conservative Judaism, which had so warmly welcomed our school for the fall semester. Thank you to ICCJ and its tenant, the Birch School, for accommodating us so graciously. We would be remiss if we did not express our appreciation to Mark Barsz, Meryl Gorochow, Howard Laufer and Gil Yellinek, the parents who enabled our relocation to our new semester venue on that ice-laden January 18th morning. 

Rabbi Dr. H. Joseph Simckes Life After Retirement

"Sharansky and Us"

This month, February 2015, we commemorate the 29th anniversary of the day when Anatoly Sharansky, the heroic Jewish Russian "refusenik" and human rights activist, was finally released from near lethal imprisonment in the Soviet Siberian Gulag on February 11th, 1986.

Thanks to the intensive international campaign to rescue him launched by his beloved wife, Avital, and the compassionate support of U.S. President Ronald Reagan, Soviet leader, Mikhail Gorbachev caved in to their pleas. Under the fig-leaf of an arranged American-Soviet "prisoner-exchange", Sharansky was freed and led across the infamous Glienicke Bridge separating East and West Berlin to freedom...and soon thereafter to a bold new life in the land of his dreams. the Holy Land, the State of Israel!

Many Americans (including a substantial number of our own congregation in Hollis Hills as well as New York Congressman, Benjamin Gilman and hundreds of similarly aroused fellow-citizens) fought long and hard for the right of Soviet Jews to practice their religion openly and freely in their native country or to be allowed to leave for the United States, Canada or Israel where they could live according to their conscience and spiritual heritage.

I am proud to affirm that the vouth of the Hollis Hills Jewish Center were also passionately involved in this human rights issue. Michelle Goldstein, Kenny Wexler and Daniel Simckes, for example- among others- were willing to face being thrown into a New York City jail for their zealous idealism in support of Russian Jewry and the morally justified public exposure of Soviet perfidy. I remember well pounding the streets of Manhattan at 3:00 AM with Harvey Goldstein in search of our imprisoned college-age children only to discover that the NYPD had somehow "forgotten" in which precinct they were being held. Apparently, our city government was covertly beholden to the Soviet government via pressure from U.N. officials in Manhattan!

Michelle, Kenny and Dani went forward to freedom (like Sharansky!), their cases were officially "forgiven", and they moved on into lives of achievement and fulfillment in Israel, baruch ha-Shem. They rejoiced as the gates of religious liberty were opened at last...and hundreds of thousands of our coreligionists streamed out of the Soviet Union to new opportunities in America and Israel, bringing with them fresh skills and energies, hopes and dreams.

Sharansky brought with him skills galore. He entered politics, wrote books, changed the lives of thousands. In 1986 the

U.S. Congress awarded him the Congressional Gold Medal. Seven years later, Pres. George W. Bush presented him with the Presidential medal of Freedom. In 2009 – only seven years ago - the Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation awarded Sharansky with the Reagan freedom Award!

Amazing, yes? What is it about this irrepressible, Jewishidentity enthralled Jew from Donetsk, Russia, born four months before the birth of the State of Israel, that has captured such a deep admiration and adulation throughout the world? Read his books, "Fear No Evil" (his autobiographical memoir of his imprisonment in the Soviet Union); "The Case For Democracy: The Power of Freedom to Overcome Tyranny and Terror"; and "Defending Identity: Its Indispensable Role in Protecting Democracy". They will give you a clue.

Our congregation has every right to take pride in our shared efforts to make this month's joyous commemoration celebrating religious freedom a reality.

I have met Natan Sharansky on several occasions in Israel. He is a gregarious, humble yet bubbly guy, bursting with ideas, proud of his heritage, and like a stocky, olive tree, blossoming with energy, inner strength, endurance and mesmerizing creativity, he is a remarkable symbol of what the human heart, driven by hope, can achieve.
