From the Desk of Rabbi David Wise <u>The Sages I</u>



Rabbi Binyamin Lau is one of the most important leaders in the Jewish

world today. He is a devoted Zionist and Orthodox rabbi who believes in multiple pathways to Jewish meaning and inspiration. This was evident when he gave a blessing to his gay brother, Amichai Lau-Lavie, at his JTS ordination a few years ago. Rabbi Lau is a harsh critic of the Israeli chief rabbinate (though he's related to the Laus who have served as chief Ashkenazi rabbis past and present). And he's the founder of the 929 Project—bringing the study of a chapter of Bible every day to all walks of Israeli life in a pluralistic fashion.

I have long wanted to read Rabbi Lau's series called *The Sages: Character, Context & Creativity.* It's a four-volume series, and in this month's issue of *The Rabbi's Nightstand*, I want to tell you that the first volume was exceptional. It fuses the words of the sages in *Pirkei Avot* with the historical events of the Second Temple Period.

It is refreshing to read an Orthodox rabbi affirm the value of

Our Cantor's Voice

The Power of Music

Many studies have proven that Music & Song is a great source of healing, both emotionally and physically. Music has a soothing effect on the mind, body and soul. They say that *music* helps secrete endorphins that help in the process of healing. Music can divert one's mind away from pain and suffering, at least temporarily. After some surgeries, patients may be encouraged to undergo music therapy while recuperating.

I recall when Congresswoman Gaby Giffords had been shot and suffered severe brain injuries, it was reported that some of her doctors were using MU-SIC as one of the forms of treatment. At that time, they explained that her injury caused damage to the left side of her brain, which controls speech, but by stimulating the right side of the brain, which is impacted by MUSIC, they were able to help the left side rejuvenate and heal. They had explained that through music therapy (singing music and hearing & working with *rhythm*), her speech would be stimulated and would improve. They would sing simple melodies with her like "Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star" which was having an impact on the improvement of her speech.

As a Cantor, I often use music when visiting the sick. When I visit those in the hospital or in hospice I try to sing a melody or prayer that I know will be familiar to them. There are times when I'm visiting someone who is very ill and in a sleep condition, and suddenly, as I am singing, I see a tear rolling down their cheek or I see a smile appear on their face. It is amazing! When they hear me singing to them, they are moved. Every time I see this, I experience overwhelming emotion!

I remember when I used to take the Children's Choir to Nursing Homes and Care Facilities, like; Parker Institute & Margaret Tietz. Once we started to sing for them, they would light up and start to clap their hands and tap their feet. They had big smiles on their faces and they were full of joy! It was amazing how they would become so invigorated.

One incredible experience June and I had was when June's mother, Lena z"I, had been stricken with Herpes Encephalitis Meningitis. She was in a coma for 3 months and the doctors thought she wouldn't make it. I used to sit at her bedside and sing to her. One day, while I was singing to her, she suddenly woke up. It was remarkable! June and I could only thank God. She lived another 11 years.

I also remember when my friend *Leon Charney* z"I was in the hospital in the ICU in a comatose state fighting for his life. (Rabbi Wise Continued from page 1)

the academic study of Jewish tradition. Some traditional Jews have felt that academia was unkind to their religious values; Rabbi Lau insists on the validity of engaging with both the yeshiva and the lecture hall. Thought it appears even before his actual achievement, I believe it is worth quoting in full. He writes in his introduction:

"In the process of my work, I endeavored to be guided by the teaching of Rabbi Elazar ben Azaria: 'Make your ear like a hopper, and acquire a perceptive heart.' The word afarkeset (=hopper) has its roots in Greek and connotes a funnel-shaped tool, one side narrow and one side broad. It serves for collecting grain prior to the sifting process. In this context, the funnel image evokes the notion of absorbing the multiplicity of audible voices, all of which are channeled into the funnel of the ear, into the receiver, from where they penetrate a person's consciousness. Rabbi Elazar instructs us to make our ear into a funnel: in other words, to open ourselves up to the expansive absorption of the many and varied voices coming from the world. The funnel neither selects nor censors: it absorbs all of the voices heard in the world of the sages. In the beit midrash there is no room for censorship. This is where a person becomes a receptacle for hearing the word of God. It is only then that the second stage arrives: 'acquire a perceptive heart.' The stages of

classification, understanding, and internalization come after the absorption stage. Here too, man is charged with the responsibility of acquiring the heart, of being able to distinguish between the voices and to identify the voices that guides him to the path of God. Every voice has its place; a person must listen to them all. Any voice emanating from God's sanctuary is holy and has a place" (pp. xv-xvi).

Rabbi Lau makes sure to incorporate this approach into his book-fusing his textual and historical presentation with reflections on contemporary applications of his analysis. For example, after unpacking the history of the relationship between the Sages and the Hasmonean ruler-priests, he notes that the modern State of Israel continues to embody that sometimes fraught relationship. He identifies two types of bravery—the "cruse of oil" spiritual tradition, and the Hasmonean tradition of fighting for independence. "None of these levels is indispensable," he writes. "Hanukka is a multifaceted festival and we aspire to reveal its many faces so that they may shed their radiance on the nation returning to its land and to its independence. But even in that independence, the small cruse of oil must be found, to enable the nation to continue its national destiny in light and goodness" (p. 168).

I plan to read one of the remaining three volumes of *The*

Sages each year. No doubt, Rabbi Lau's scholarship will be exceeded only by his principled love of the Jewish People. The Sages is a great addition to your home Jewish library!



His wife called me and asked me to come to the hospital and sing to him. She firmly believed that music, specifically Cantorial music, would help bring him out of his dire state and bring him back. After all, Leon was a lover of Cantorial music. Two other Cantors that Leon loved also came to sing at his bedside. Well, after time, he did progress, came out of his coma and was finally able to leave the hospital. He was still not functioning well but he did survive the life-threatening episode and was able to live life for several years to come. He even came to our first concert at Lefrak Concert Hall with his wife Tzili.

Research has also shown that MEMORY is affected by many different factors and one of these factors is indeed MUSIC, which stimulates part of the brain. Many studies show that MUSIC ENHANCES the STORAGE AND RECALL OF MEMORY. Therapists now use *Music Therapy* to help people suffering from Alzheimer's and dementia.

Recently, the *TODAY* Show, on *NBC*, presented a segment on *THE POWER OF MUSIC*. Their first story was about a "*SINGING NURSE*" from Staten Island, who goes to patient's homes (as a visiting nurse) and in addition to performing the necessary medical treatments like taking blood pressure, administering medications, taking care of wounds, etc., she also sings with them.

She sings all different sorts of songs, whatever the patients like. As they pointed out in the segment, she is like a virtual jukebox. She sings cute little melodies, TV Show Theme songs, pop, and even rock and so much more. She sings whatever the patients like and whatever song makes them feel good. You could see the patients light up, sing along and look at ease, and she does it with warmth. It was beautiful to see!

The TODAY show also showed another story about an OR-CHESTRA that was comprised of individuals, many of whom were dealing with difficult issues in their lives. As an "ORCHESTRA", they became a FAMILY. The comradery and friendship they experience while sharing & creating music together, elevates their spirits and helps them get through some of their personal difficulties. They explain how their CONDUCTOR is also part of their Musical Family and you could see in their faces how much being a part of the Orchestra helped them feel a sense of belonging and community and made them feel better about life! It seems that there are several of such community Orchestras across the country, lifting spirits & emotions!

Although I am a Cantor & I live and breathe music on a daily basis, I am still always amazed at the **POWER OF MUSIC** and the incredible effect it has on people's minds, bodies & souls!

Rabbi Dr. H. Joseph Simckes Life After Retirement

"An Oldie But a Goodie!"

How Does Moses Like His Tea...Hebrews It!

Now that I have your attention (as well, I hope, as your forgiveness for the *silly/charming* superscription above), let's proceed to a more sobering concern: the challenge of *informed* patriotism. Ok? Pres. Reagan, I believe, cited that concept decades ago. Clearly it has continuing relevance. In today's swirling times when *globalization-mania* pre-occupies so much of our political conversation, responsible local citizenship demands re-examination.

Brexit should have tipped us off. Compassionate concern for the welfare of the wide, wide world...beyond the immediate needs of our own families, friends and neighbors... requires moral boundaries & practical restraints. Such restraints do not reflect or in any way constitute isolationism. Jews such as myself, the child of immigrants in desperate flight from tyranny overseas, understand that distinction only too well. As does Chana.

Indifference to the needs of strangers is anathema to our Jewish moral/religious code. Our patriarchal father Abraham, our Midrash tells us, had four entrances to his tent so that a thirsty stranger from the east or west, north or south, could reach him — or he could reach out as swiftly and helpfully as possible to them.

On the other hand, a father who feeds the hungry children living next door before_he feeds his own three kids living under his own leaking roof would probably not win "The Father of the Year" award...would he? Our Talmud taught us long ago, "ANIYEI IRCHA KODMIM!" i.e. "The Poor of Your Own City Should Be Fed First!" Agreed.

At this point, we need some careful, sophisticated analysis. Let's try. Our Torah has given us this magnificent commandment: "V'AHAVTA L'REIACHA KAMOCHA" i.e. "Thou Shalt Love Thy Neighbor As Thyself". Right? Everyone is familiar with this mitzvah. Christian theology, borrowing from our scriptural sources makes this Jewish concept central to its faith. Secular western culture similarly has made this Jewish ethical principle a pillar of modern society. However, what if an individual's "amour propre", i.e. self-love, is low, weak, wobbly? Worse, what if he/she secretly despises him/herself? Or, what if a person is a humble type who doesn't give himself/herself enough credit for his/her own worth?

That implies that individuals with low self-esteem may never give others sufficient credit for their_actual worth! Unconsciously, some hollow-souled folks may even go around overevaluating others just to make up for their own self-underestimation! What's the solution? Simple: In order to love others appropriately, you first have to love yourself ap-

propriately! Self respect comes first!

Our ancient Rabbinic sage, Hillel put it this way: "IM EIN ANI LI, MI LI!" i.e. "If I Am Not For Myself, Who Will Be For Me! But if I am for myself alone, what am I?" Applying that Rabbinic concept to our new administration in Washington and its commitment to "Make America Great Again!", we can rightly infer that it is perfectly moral - and indeed wise - for our government to prioritize our own economic, social, cultural, military and political strength. Such a strategy would empower us to reach out to other nations and individuals in need with greater efficacy and authority...not based on initial selfishness or arrogance but on common sense and traditional ethical/ spiritual insight.

Esther and Mordechai made the same plea: Save the Jews first from Haman's tyrannical ambitions and then the entire Persian empire with its huge global reach will be similarly redeemed from destruction. Purim has many lessons for us. Appropriate self prioritization is one of them! The airlines admonish us similarly: Put on your oxygen mask first and then put on your child's mask in cases of emergency!

G-d bless a strong, great again America! Nations in need all over our shared globe-including our beloved Israel- will be much better off with an economically, educationally and
