Plato and Aristotle



How well do you remember studying Plato and Aristotle? I, frankly, don't

think I ever did, even though I took political theory in college. For me, the exercise of reading is a way to fill in the gaps in my education or to make up for all the times I didn't pay attention in my years of schooling. So one of the most useful books I've read in a long time is what I'll feature in this month's issue of The Rabbi's Nightstand. It's called The Cave and the Light: Plato Versus Aristotle and the Struggle for the Soul of Western Civilization. The author, history professor Arthur Herman, begins by introducing the reader to Socrates, his student Plato, and Plato's student and later rival Aristotle. He then takes the reader on a tour of almost every major political, scientific, religious and artistic twist and turn of the last 2,400 years. Shifts in intellectual trends are seen as the swinging of the pendulum from Platonic to Aristotelian thought and back. Paul of Tarsus. Michelangelo, Martin Luther, Isaac Newton, Rousseau, and Charles Darwin all feature in this story of Western thought, among scores of others. But as

Herman has said, we should see conflict through history not as science versus religion, or reason versus emotion, but simply as Plato versus Aristotle. Every conflict comes back to this first philosophical debate. So the history of Western culture is the seeking of a balance between these two early philosophers, and all progress is the result of that search. Charles Murray of the American Enterprise Institute, who hosted Herman soon after he wrote the book in 2013, praised the author for providing an antidote to the "nonjudgmentalism" common on college campuses. "It portrays throughout history the ways in which all progress has depended on people making judgments" about ethics, aesthetics, science, and so on. In other words, while we should learn about competing perspectives, we should ultimately take a stand and pick one! Murray is correct that we tend to educate from a nonjudgmental perspective so as not to offend anyone. But the other, opposite trend is what I call the Facebook Echo Chamber, in which we read the postings of our like-minded friends and feel self-validation without needing to be open to other points of view. Having "taken a stand and chosen," as I said above, we then dig in our heels and, worse, cover our ears when someone is about to say something with which we don't agree. Maybe that explains our current political culture, in which foiling the opponent

seems more important than accomplishing actually anything through cooperation. Just as I was writing this column, Forward published an essay by Yossi Klein Halevi on the upcoming 50th anniversary of the Six Day War called A Jubilee For Our Political Certainties. In it, he noted that when it comes to the results of that victory, Israelis have their version of Plato and Aristotle: the poet Natan Alterman, who advocated for annexing the "liberated territories," and novelist Amos Oz, who insisted that only people could be "liberated," but that land and the other People who lived on it could only be "occupied." The debate hasn't changed much from that formulation in 50 years, and it's insoluble because, as Halevi writes, "each side is speaking an essential truth." And Halevi, along with a majority of Israelis, have assimilated both truths, leaving them in the center. The problem with the center, in light of both Arthur Herman's book and Israeli politics, is that i t can lead t o "nonjudgmentalism" or paralysis. He's right, she's right, everyone's right, and no decisions are made. Halevi, though, gives us another approach: "My point is not to advocate for the center as a political position... but as a sensibility. Whatever one's politics, a centrist sensibility requires profound grappling with the commitments and fears of the other camp. The goal of this process isn't to necessarily change one's politics, but to soften them. The challenge of a centrist sensibility isn't ultimately political but spiritual: an invitation to humility." Life without disagreement is boring. Life without *polite* disagreement is intolerable. Are you with Aristotle or Plato? With Alterman or Oz? Choose a side, but embrace your opponent.

Rabbi Dr. H. Joseph Simckes Life After Retirement

<u>Why Remember Tzorres?</u> (An Oldie But Still a Goodie!)

Tucked away in our Hebrew calendar is a bitter memory which pops up every year on the tenth day of the Hebrew month of *Tevet* in the late fall. At that time we Jews officially commemorate a thorny moment of our history which tears through the protective membrane of our communal memory, prodding us to an unwelcome acknowledgement of our collective vulnerability.

Oy vey, kinderlach...it's here again! The tenth of Tevet*! A day of fasting! A day of terror! A time signaling pending death and disaster!

Who wants to remember "Asarah b'Tevet", i.e. the tenth of Tevet, the day the Babylonians began their fatal siege (fatal for us not for them!) of Jerusalem? That was a time of unspeakable terror, heralding inglorious defeat, hideous death and national disaster. Besides, that particular slice of infamy took place almost 3000 years ago! Who cares! What purpose does it serve to carve that event into the template of normative Jewish memory?

Asking Jews to remember the calamitous sorrows associated with the *tenth of Tevet*, *586 B.C.E.* is like asking a former prisoner who was once condemned to death by hanging to recall the day the noose was slipped around his neck. Isn't it somewhat masochistic to require him to recollect the rough hemp fiber coiling round his throat in an ugly embrace of near death?

The Babylonian siege of Jerusalem was, in effect, the placing of a deadly military noose around the capital of Judea. It signaled the slow but sure strangulation of Jewish national life. It prefaced the destruction of the Holy Temple on the 9th of Av and rehearsed the ultimate exile of the Jewish People from their ancestral homeland. It was the first act of a savage drama encompassing 2000 years of Jewish homelessness,. Historically, it is fair to say that the tenth of Tevet was the preamble to Jewish corporate existence as political orphans.

And yet, had the Rabbi's of old not embedded that dreadful day, *the tenth of Tevet* (when the Babylonian siege of Judea's capital began) in our Hebrew calendar as an official day of commemoration, it is possible that our future as a viable religious civilization would have been jeopardized. Over the centuries it has functioned as a galvanizing warning of potential national or spiritual peril.

The Rabbi's of old who established our Hebrew calendar wanted their progeny to be geo -politically savvy, globally alert, pro-actively sensitive to potential predators before they pounced. Long before "simper paratus" became the official motto of the U.S. Coast Guard, the ancient sages of Israel were busy devising ways of creating a culture whose adherents were trained to see the world with "a third eye", anticipating future dangers by remembering past tragedies.

The leaders of our country, *America*, have tried to do no less. *December* 7th has been burned into our national memory as a *"Day of Infamy"* not to demonize the Japanese people but to concretize our systems

of military preparedness to the degree that such attacks upon our citizens and values are nipped in the bud. Similarly, following the tragic sinking of the Titanic, it would be more than mere folly or arrogance to build a ship without an adequate number of lifeboats. It would be criminal!

Theoretically, the horrors of 911 might have been prevented had we had in place a sufficiently sophisticated "alerting system" to pending danger. Such systems, regrettably do not exist. However, the mindset that strives for such national preparedness, while it runs grave risks of negative excesses, is still necessary for our survival. Hence our Rabbinic sages wisely added the 10th of Tevet to our Hebrew calendar as a day of preparedness through remembrance.

Why? Simple answer. Jews are expected to learn from tradedy. To mourn yes, but also to grow in wisdom, strength, courage, hope and preparedness. Our experience as a people has taught us to remember catastrophes - wisely and creatively - in order to protect ourselves from preventable disasters in the future. ** To forget disasters is to die thrice: once in the flames of the original conflagration: twice in the embers of that historical event; thrice when that forgotten disaster repeats itself though future ignorance, lassitude and lack of preparedness.

Our Jewish calendar is one of our most precious tools for rising from the ashes. Only by remembering the flames – from whence they came and how or if - they were extinguished, can we protect ourselves from future devastation. The tenth of Tevet is, therefore, well worth

Jonathan and Jeremy are 8th grade Honor Roll students at MS 74. Next year, Jonathan will be attending Cardozo High School and Jeremy will be going to Brooklyn Tech. They both love science and social studies and have both been active in their school community albeit in different ways. Since 6th grade, Jonathan has been a leader on the MS 74 Anti-Bullying/Peer Counseling Team and has served as a traffic captain each morning helping his fellow students safely navigate the sometimes crazy morning traffic patterns in front of the school. Jeremy has been elected Student Organization class representative during 6th, 7th and 8th grade and has been part of MS 74's chapter of Rachel's Challenge as well as the RFA - Respect for All school-wide initiative. remembering. Only by preserving all the pieces of the puzzle – especially the jagged edges of our tumultuous history can we guarantee that our destiny as " *a light unto the nations!*" will be fulfilled. Our existence as the bearers of that light is crucial.

The historian Barbara Tuchman once wrote "...of all the peoples of the Western world from 3000 years ago, it is only the Jews who live in the same place, speak the same language, and practice the same religion." By taking seriously all the vital data of our glorious and inglorious past we have learned how to survive, how to protect our faith and empower ourselves in order to share our insights and sanctifying truths with all our fellow human beings. We do so in humility, vigor and love. In that process, the tenth of Tevet plays a respected and significant role. The question is not so much why we should remember our *Tzorres* but how!
