From the Desk of Rabbi David Wise Two Heads, One Body, One People



It was the opening session of this summer's Rabbinic Torah

Seminar at the Hartman Institute in Jerusalem, and the president of the machon, Donniel Hartman, was setting the scene for our next 10 days of intensive learning. He told us that he was recently on a panel in the Bay Area in a conversation convened by the local Jew-Community Relations Council, and his friend the moderator, a Christian minister, asked him what being a Zionist meant to him. His immediate response was, "I am a nationalist." He spoke about how as a Jew, being part of a nation is a crucial framework for understanding who he is and the choices he makes. And the moderator stopped him and said, "Donniel, we love you. But the minute you said you were a nationalist, you lost me." And she turned to the audience and asked, "Who else felt the same?" And 95% of the audience, including many Jews, raised their hands.

Thus began ten days of grappling with the theme of the seminar, called "Between Loy-

alty and Imagination: Nationalism and Tribalism in a Global Era." I have to hand it to Hartman, both the man and the institute. It was certainly courageous to tackle this theme, teaching a self-selected group of mostly non -Orthodox, mostly American, rabbis, just weeks after Donald Trump announced, "I am a nationalist." But we spent ten days tracing the idea of Jewish nationalism from the Bible, to the Talmud, through Jewish history and literature, into mystical readings, and into modern Israel-its popular music and its political debates. This learning made me delve deeper into what it means for us, the Jewish People, to be a nation.

Then, the rest of the summer unfolded, and several things happened that made me wonder what exactly this Jewish People thinks and does to itself. Two moments stand out. The President of the United States said, "I think that any Jewish people who vote for a Democrat, I think it shows either a total lack of knowledge or great disloyalty." The use of the term loyalty in an utterance from the highest elected official in the land sparked outrage in many Jews, but not from the Republican Jewish Coalition, who, without waiting for the president to clarify to whom such Jews were being disloyal, said: "President Trump is right, it shows a great deal of disloyalty to oneself to defend a party that protects/emboldens people that hate you for your religion." Thankfully, Representative Lee Zeldin, one of only two

Jewish Republicans in the House, pushed back against the language. "It's a word that I wouldn't use, with a long history of being used by others who have a hatred towards Jews and Israel."

The second moment that brought our Peoplehood under the microscope was soon after the release of Bari Weiss' book, How to Fight Anti-Semitism. Weiss, a columnist for the New York Times, is from Pittsburgh, and her parents sometimes attended Shabbat morning services at Tree of Life congregation. The murderous shooting rampage last October by a vicious Antisemite and white supremacist shook Weiss deeply. So she set out to write a book, and has spoken around the country. Weiss, like Deborah Lipstadt in her recent book Antisemitism Here and Now. made it clear that hatred of Jews and demonization of Israel come from three precincts—the far right, the far left, and from radical Islam. Their hatred takes different forms, but it is all hatred. So who slammed her book loudly? The Jewish left, who were clearly insulted that Weiss gave equal attention to the hatred that comes from elected officials in their own camp. It's a phenomenon that I've experienced as well—to some on the Jewish left, anyone to the right of them is by association part of the vilified right. To them, the term "moderate" is a fig leaf for conservative, repressive beliefs and policies.

Here's what bothers me most about these two episodes. Jews

were attacked, and other Jews chose sides. What happened to Peoplehood? Are we not a tribe, a nation?

This summer, I learned a most ridiculous Talmudic question, but it happens to have the most sublime philosophical answer. It's addressed by the Rav, Rabbi Yosef Dov Soloveitchik, in his essay Kol Dodi Dofek—"the voice of my beloved knocks." Micah Goodman taught it to us in his talk on nationalism in the Bible at Hartman. The Talmud asks: a man with one body and two heads—how many sets of tefillin must he put on? If you think that it is one person who simply happens to have two heads, then he should only put on one set of tefillin. But if you think that this is actually two distinct people with only one body, then a set of tefillin should be put on each head. I told you it was ridiculous, but the Talmud's answer doesn't matter. Rav Soloveitchik proposed this answer: take boiling water, and pour it over one of the heads. If the other head doesn't scream, they are two distinct people, and each head must wear tefillin. If the other head cries out—in pain, or even in sympathy—then it is one person, and one set of tefillin will do.

The Rav's solution is also, on the surface, ridiculous—until you consider the *nimshal*, the application of what is clearly not a real legal question, but a parable for something profound. The Jewish People in our day—when we live in an era with two thriving Jewish communities, Israel and the Diapsora, most notably North Amer-

ica—has two heads. In Israel, the Jewish People are made up of multiple ethnic groups, but at the core Israeli Jews are either white Europeans or Jews of Color from Arab lands and Africa—that's two heads. In this country, Jews still have the right to register or vote for either of the major political parties, or even to stay independent that's two heads. When one head is threatened, or attacked, with words, with online harassment, with graffiti or arson or cemetery desecration, or assaulted, as in Brooklyn recently and frequently, or shot at, as in Pittsburgh or Poway, how does the other head respond? If we feel no pain, let alone sympathy, and validate the verbal assault, or ignore the suffering because those Jews look different, believe and pray differently, vote differently, or live in a place we don't value, or think they shouldn't live-we are two bodies. And frankly, if we are two bodies, there aren't enough sets of tefillin in the world to satisfy our religious duties.


But if one head is scalded with boiling water, the natural thing for *Goy Ehad ba-aretz*, one People on this earth, to do is to scream out. We start with empathy—if you are in pain, so I am—the pain we feel psychosomatically when a child or sibling or parent or partner suffers. We must hurt, too. And we must cry out and say, "No one says that to, or about, and no one does that to, my sister. I stand with Jews, even and especially those

Jews who are most unlike me, because we are not going to be broken into teams by those who seek to divide us. We may wear different uniforms, but we are on the same team."

Let me approach this from another angle. My colleague Rabbi Howard Stecker recently told a story about an exercise he did with religious school families in his shul in Great Neck. He asked them what traits and skills they most wanted their kids to achieve, and in addition to the usual answers of "honesty" and "hard work," their number one answer was "independence." There's nothing wrong with wanting our kids to become independent, and the Hebrew term for it, atzmaut, is certainly a powerful concept in the modern Jewish experience. But as a concept in our tradition, it's not so prominent. The closest we find to mention of atzmaut in the Torah is when Moshe warns the Israelites about one day looking around the bounty of the Land and saying kohi ve'otzem yadi asah li et hahayil hazeh, that "my strength and initiative-my independence-made all this happen." That's not exactly a celebration of independence. Rather, the Jewish concept is arevut, which means interdependence. In the Book of Genesis, it becomes the symbol of destiny for the first Jew-not Avraham, but Yehudah. Remember when he won't let his daughter-in-law, Tamar, marry his last remaining son. Shelah. because his two older sons Er and Onan have died after marry-

ing her? Then Tamar dresses up as a prostitute, and Yehudah unwittingly sleeps with her, but not until he leaves collateral—an eiravon. And when he learns that Tamar is pregnant and is prepared to have her executed, and she produces the eiravon, Yehudah realizes that she is in the right, and accepts responsibility. Years later, Yehudah is trying to convince his father Ya'akov to allow Binyamin to go down to Egypt, because that's what the minister in charge of food disbursements demands. Ya'akov is unwilling to part with that son, having already lost Yosef. So what does Yehudah say to finally move the needle? Anokhi e'ervenu miyadi tevakshenu, "I myself will be surety for him; you may hold me responsible." He learned from Tamar that there's no such thing as pure independence; there is, however, sacred independence. From this comes the rabbinic maxim, Kol Yisrael 'arevin zeh bazeh, "All Jews are pledges for one another"—interdependent.

It's not just a Jewish thing, by the way. In his book Lost Connections, Johan Hari seeks the causes of depression and the non-pharmaceutical solutions to it. One such cause is disconnection from other people. He quotes the late John Cacioppo, the University of Chicago professor who invented the field of social neuroscience. "You and I exist for one reason—because the first human beings, who lived on the savannas of Africa, figured out how to cooperate.



Recently we heard from our guest speaker, Nancy Churnin, who passionately shared her book, Irving Berlin with the students. The children were engaged and immensely enjoyed her power point presentation of the fascinating story of Irving Berlin and his many great accomplishments he made during his lifetime. Afterwards, Nancy Churnin showed the children a book written in braille and each of the students had the opportunity to feel the braille letters for themselves. They shared their food. They looked after the sick. They survive because of a dense network of social connections. If you got separated from the tribe, you would feel terrible—vulnerable and depressed. So every human instinct is honed not for a life on your own, but for life like this, in a tribe. Humans need tribes as much as bees need a hive."

So to return to my original question-why do so many Jews struggle with the idea of Peoplehood, or the dirtier words tribe and nation? It's probably because they can't see the difference between prioritization, which has great moral weight, and discrimination, which is a great moral crime. We always prioritize those who are closest to us-family is called next of kin, and they deserve our first and greatest commitments. And we must be careful not to discriminate against those who are not of us, like us. At times, it can be a fine line to walk, as we at Hartman saw when we analyzed Israel's controversial Nation-State Law. Donniel Hartman taught us two great documents of Jewish Nationalism: the first is God's first call to Avram, Lekh-Lekha; the other is Megillat Haatzmaut, Israel's Declaration of Independence. Each walks that fine line between prioritization and discrimination. Avram is told Lekh-Lekha, to get out of Dodge, to leave his old world behind, and to be mei'ever, on the other side of everyone else. Then he is told ve-heyeh berakhah, "be a blessing"—to

whom? To everyone else! It is both a rejection of the larger world and a demand to be in service of the larger world. Israel's Declaration of Independence does the same, both for its citizens and for relations with Diaspora Jewry. The new State will be open to Jewish immigration from all over the world-but it will also guarantee the rights of all its minorities. It says Lekh-Lekha, come here, and if you choose not to, heyeh berakhah, be a blessing where you are. It is possible to be a Nationalist and still respect and love the other.

As we begin Tav Shin Peh, 5780, we need to go out of our way to affirm that we are 'Am Yisrael, part of the glorious and crazy People of Israel. The last Shabbat in October is the first Shabbat after the Hagim, and the anniversary of Pittsburgh. The American Jewish Committee has again initiated #showupforShabbat campaign, and the next day is a large Day of Action Against Antisemitism event at Central Synagogue in Manhattan. And I urge you to read Deborah Lipstadt's and Bari Weiss's books, especially the chapters with action items. I'll highlight two from Weiss's final chapter "How to Fight:" One is "don't trust people who seek to divide Jews;' the second is "fight the anti-Semitism on our own side." As Rabbi Angela Buchdahl of Central Synagogue said in her sermon on this day last year, and as I have said numerous times: "In order to be principled in this fight, we must be willing to call out the anti-Semitism on our own side of the aisle. It's easy to convince ourselves that the one on 'our side' exists only at the powerless fringe, or that it's outweighed by more important ideological alliances. But we have to be as intolerant of anti-Semitism from our political allies as from our foes." So kol hakavod to the Women's March for booting its old leadership, and for moving quickly to dump one of the replacements who was just as toxic. And go Zioness Movement, who call themselves Unabashedly Progressive; Unapologetically Zionist, for taking on this fight and others to support Queer Jews who want to march in Pride with Jewish stars on their flags. That's what it means to have multiple uniforms, but to insist that we are One People.

Throughout the Amidah on Rosh Hashanah and again on Yom Kippur, in the blessing about holiness, we God's say "Veyei'asu kulam agudah ahat la'asot levavkha beleivav shalem, May they become one bound entity, in order to fulfill Your will with a full heart." We are stronger together. We do God's work best when we are connected. That's Jewish Nationalism, the legacy of Avraham and Sarah, the interdependence of Yehudah and Binyamin, of America and the Diaspora, Ashkenazi and Sefaradi, Blue and Red. We are two heads, but we must be just one body. Only then do we merit saying Am Yisrael Hai. Shanah Tovah!
