 From the Desk of Rabbi David Wise <u>Ehpat Li</u> I Care About Israel



I confess that, back in August, I shed many tears when our daughter, our

only daughter, whom we love, Jordana, made Aliyah to Israel along with 230 other Americans. But I also had many reasons to smile. Yes, she was fulfilling her dream, and in many ways, ours. Seeing her among 70 future lone soldiers was a source of intense pride. Singing Hatikvah at JFK before saying goodbye was a validation of the values that fill our home, and I was overjoyed. I was so pleased when she sent me pictures of her with Rabbi Simckes and Chana at Ben-Gurion airport, as they were there to welcome their brother Seymour, who also made Aliyah.

There was one more *Aliyah*connected moment that made me smile. As I watched the livestream of the welcome ceremony for new *Olim* at Ben-Gurion, I saw Rabbi David Lau, the chief Ashkenazi rabbi of Israel, sitting next to Rabbi Yehoshua Fass, the Orthodox founder of *Nefesh B'Nefesh*, the organization responsible for thousands of Jews making Is-

I have been watching the news, like so many, and seeing all the images of how hurricanes Harvey and Irma have caused so much destruction & damage to the residents of Texas and Florida and how so many people are suffering terribly. What I have also been seeing is how so many have come together to help...neighbors helping neighbors...Regardless of background, ethnicity, religion or race, the people of Texas and Florida and the whole country have shown what humanity and Chesed truly are.

I am very moved by the Jewish community's reaction and AC-TION in helping those in need and who are in distress. Although we have not seen much on the news, I have heard from many of my friends and family across the country and from reading the Jewish news that from Coast to Coast, Jewish communities and organizations have come together in an effort to help residents in Texas and Florida get through the devastation. Jewish communities and organizations across the country are holding food drives and fundraising drives. There are many volunteers across the country who have been loading trucks with supplies and food and heading to the areas affected. Many Jewish families have opened up their homes to those either who were evacuated or who cannot go back to their homes. I heard that kosher food companies have donated truckloads of food. Synagogues and other Jewish organizations helped Texas and Florida residents find food, shelter and religious services, as the storms battered their homes and neighborhoods.

Actually, as I was writing this article I received an email about one of my dear colleagues and friends who is a Cantor in Houston. I just learned that he was terribly impacted by Hurricane Harvey. He lost his home and everything in it and he is in need of almost everything, from clothing to rebuilding his house. He also lost his Cantorial book collection, which we are trying to help him replenish. The "Cantors" community is trying to help him in any way we can.

We can see how important *Chesed* is and I am so proud that we at **HHBJC** have such a wonderful *Chesed Committee* and *Congregational Nurse Program* who are ALWAYS THERE TO HELP!

rael their new home. This smile, though, was bathed in irony. You see, Rabbi Fass somehow made it on the notorious blacklist of 160 or so rabbis whose affirmation of the Jewish identity of people who sought to marry through Rabbi Lau's chief rabbinate were rejected by that holy bureaucracy. And while Rabbi Fass received an almost immediate and public apology from Rabbi Lau, I'm still waiting for the same honor to be bestowed upon the other blacklisted rabbis, like my friend Rabbi Michael Pont, of Marlboro, NJ, or Rabbi Irwin Groner, who has resided in the next world for nearly five years, or a certain Rabbi David Weiss, of no known relation.

The release of the blacklist came in the midst of a turbulent two weeks, when relations between Israel and Diaspora Jewry reached new, dangerous lows. There was Prime Minister Netanyahu's suspension of the carefully negotiated Kotel compromise, and a new conversion bill that would have further delegitimized non-Orthodox rabbis in Israeli law. The outcry was immediate and forceful, with Chicago's Jewish Federation announcing that any Knesset member who voted for the bill would be persona non grata in their town. AIPAC, who usually stays out of the Jewish Peoplehood conversation, sent a highlevel delegation to express the concerns of American Jewry. Even staunch supporters of the Israel-Diaspora relationship, namely Daniel Gordis, called for

American Jews to flex their financial muscles to get the message across, even if it meant hurting El Al or Israeli hospitals. Needless to say, there wasn't much smiling happening.

In the midst of this crisis, my thoughts turned to Rosh Hashanah, when I knew I would in some way address the importance of Israel with my congregation of again-spurned Diaspora Jews. My thoughts then turned to this coming April, when I will be co-leading a trip to celebrate the 70th anniversary of Israel's independence on Yom Ha'atzmaut itself! And of course, my thoughts turned to Jordie in uniform at the end of November. I felt a bit like Avraham, whose ongoing devotion to God was met with yet another demand-it's not enough; now go sacrifice your child. With all these thoughts, what did I do? I smiled, feeling the joy of an unmistakable connection: Ehpat li. I care about Israel.

It seems to me that the challenge in bridging the gap between Diaspora Jews and Israel is precisely about the degree to which we who live outside of Israel can say these words truthfully: *Ehpat Lanu*—we really care. Can we say this and mean it? And by "we," I mean non-Orthodox American Jews. I raise this hard question based on two observations. The first is drawn from reading a new book by Sara Yael Hirschhorn, who teaches at Oxford, called City on a Hilltop: American Jews

and the Israeli Settler Movement. It's a scholarly study of the disproportionate rate of Americans who made conscious decisions to live outside the Green Line-with particular emphasis on Yamit, the shortlived settlement in the Sinai, Efrat, and Tekoa. While not all American Olim featured in the book would identify as Orthodox, the driving forces behind the formation of these communities were-notably, Rabbi Shlomo Riskin, once of Lincoln Square Synagogue and for decades the chief rabbi of Efrat.

My second observation took place at JFK, where I mingled with families who were sending off their children as lone soldiers, or themselves making Aliyah. The Jewish Week ran a story about that Aliyah flight, including a demographic analysis by that same Rabbi Fass. Compared to the early years of Nefesh b'Nefesh. "todav's Modern Orthodox families that make Alivah tend to be smaller, with fewer children, and there's an increase in the number of non-Orthodox singles making Aliyah" on their own. The organization's statistics say that while 65-70 percent of families identify as Orthodox, 68-70 percent of young single olim define themselves as non-Orthodox. Surely a whole host of factors are at play here, but one can't help but notice that while Orthodox Americans move to Israel with their families. non-Orthodox ones do so without them.



H2I got off to a great start in September, with programs like our Ice Cream Icebreakers, The Amazing Race, and a High Holiday Carnival. At these programs, our new and old members had a chance to get to know each other better through some teambuilding exercises, and learned about the fall holidays through some entertaining programs based on the themes of the High Holy Days

As we move into October, we have a number of exciting programs planned for all of our groups. On Sunday, October 1, our Nitzanim and Chalutzim groups (Grades 2-5) will be taking part in "As Easy as ABC," where they'll compete in a series of games involving the alphabet, and our Kadimaniks (Grades 6-8) will participate in "As Sweet as Candy," a night of candy-filled competitions. At the same time, it became clear after the Kotel agreement snafu that non-Orthodox American Jewry was not a population to be trifled with. The overwhelming majority of AIPAC leaders and members, after all, are non-Orthodox, as are the leaders and decision-makers at Jewish Federations of North America. And regardless of our feelings of being betrayed, the arms of Conservative Judaism were clear in our letter to the Prime Minister that we will continue to advocate strongly and clearly for support of the State of Israel. Because ehpat lanuwe care.

The late Charles Liebman, one of the greatest scholars of the American-Israeli dynamic, once said that Israelis like to talk about the assimilation of American Jews, because it makes them feel better about what they have. We, on the other hand, like talking about religious pluralism, because it makes us feel better about what we have. We have spent years lecturing each other about what the other needs to do to improve! The new challenge is that there are now more Jews in Israel than in America; they feel they've become the senior partner in the relationship. I believe, though, that Jewish Peoplehood is so crucial that neither party gets to dictate to the other what should be its top priority. Now is the time for engagement, not separation. In order to assert Ehpat lanu-we care-we Diaspora Jews need to act in ways that prove our

passion and sincerity. We need to do so with our resources, with our feet, and perhaps even with our life decisions. One of the themes of Rosh Hashanah is that we are challenged to work at mending relationships. So consider that the keys to achieving this in terms of the Israel-Diaspora relationship is a familiar triad, only in reverse order: *Tzedakah*, *tefillah*, and *teshuvah*—financial support, authentic prayer, and real return.

In light of this summer's tension, I believe that it is more important than ever to make Israel a major recipient of our tzedakah. That said, I am pledging that my gifts, both personal and from my Rabbinic Discretionary Fund, will specifically go to support those Israeli institutions that further the cause of religious pluralism. The Masorti Movement, Hiddush. and the Shalom Hartman Institute are the usual standardbearers, and they continue to do great work on pluralism. But I'm particularly impressed this year by the work of the 929 Project, an initiative founded by an Orthodox rabbi, Benny Lau, a champion of a new form of Israeli Judaism. This Rabbi Lau, a relative of the chief rabbi I mentioned earlier, tells a story about a visit to a secular high school in Tel Aviv, where just before meeting with the students, he found an army-issue Tanakh. He asked the students if it belonged to any of them. The students erupted in laughter. One girl's four-word comment struck him hard: "Rabbi, zeh lo shelanu-Rabbi, it's not ours." On behalf of her classmates, this young woman disavowed any potential ownership of a Hebrew Bible by secular Jewish Israelis. "But I found it, and the Torah commands me to return lost objects!" said Rabbi Lau. The students then began arguing among themselves about whose book it is. Maybe it belongs to the Haredim, maybe it's a settler's, but its owner won't be found in our community.

That's when the 929 Project was born. 929 is the number of chapters in the Hebrew Bible. Five days a week, 929's Hebrew web page hosts 20 commentators of all sectors of Jewish Israeli society engaging and wrestling with a chapter of our sacred text-men and women, religious and secular, Ashkenazi and Sefardi, Orthodox and non-Orthodox. For Selihot just a few nights ago, Rabbi Lau's Rambam synagogue, where I said kaddish for my father on Pesah, joined with Tziyon, a new Israeli non-Orthodox kehillah led by Rabbah Tamar Elad Applebaum. It's the kind of initiative that makes me hopeful about the future state of Judaism in the State of the Jews. Tzedakah-targeting causes that meet our values-is evidence that *ehpat* lanu, we care.

We also need to prove our devotion with our *tefillah*—our prayers. But that's not just prayer from a distance; it's praying with our feet. I like Schechter Institute President

Rabbi David Golinkin's bold plan-that we should demonstrate the vitality of non-Orthodox prayer by bringing one million worshippers to Robinson's Arch, known as Ezrat Yisrael, every year. The Prime Minister cannot possibly ignore us when we have boots on the ground in such striking numbers. The Israeli Supreme Court may force his hand anyway, but that's not the way we want to win. We want the Kotel Compromise to be brought to fruition on the momentum of thousands and thousands of Jews praying just as we pray here-men and women together, using our traditional and modern liturgy, with the legitimacy we deserve. I can't wait to daven there with you this April 19, on our three-shul Israel trip with Hillcrest and ICCJ, as we celebrate the extraordinary milestone of Israel's 70th anniversary by praying at that very place! This is the trip of a lifetime, an experience not to be missed. What a great way to demonstrate that ehpat lanuwe care, and we want Israel to take note of our tefillah!

Finally, we need to embrace *Aliyah* as more than a fantasy that's only lived out by Orthodox families and a few handsfull of our craziest kids (mine included). At the same time that we assert the unassailable legitimacy of Jewish life outside of Israel, we need to make *Aliyah* a live option for Conservative Jewish families without fear or shame. This is what I mean

by *teshuvah*—a return, not in the usual Rosh Hashanah sense of repentance, but a return home.

I admit that I always feel a pang of envy when I hear the story of Rabbi Riskin's "Garin Reishit Geula"-the 1970s seed colony that eventually became Efrat. Lincoln Square congregant Edward Abramson explained it this way: "The State of Israel had played an active role throughout the synagogue's early years to an extent that was rare in those days." Rabbi Riskin reframed Zionism as relevant to the living history of his congregants. "This role was not only the more typical one of Israel as recipient of tzedakah, the focus of financial appeals, welfare, and stability. Nor was Israel's role in the synagogue relegated 'Israel: the Museum'-a to place to visit to see the footsteps of Jewish history. Rather, the role highlighted two aspects of Israel that were often downplayed in those years: Israel as a place for Jews to live, and Israel as the center of Torah, the locus from which redemption would sprout." How wonderful would it be to see a Conservative synagogue form a Garin, and transplant itself in Eretz Yisrael? Just sayin'!

When we gave Jordie an *Aliyah* to the Torah on her last Shabbat in Queens, I told the story of my parents' *Aliyah* dream, and I'll repeat it here. My parents met in *Hashomer Hatzair*, a secular, socialist Zionist youth movement, and both wanted to

move to Israel. Soon after they married in 1950, they went on hakhsharah-preparation for Aliyah-with their garin, their group of pioneers, to a farm in upstate New York. But I didn't hear this story until around their 50th anniversary, and I knew well that their first trip was mine as well, for my sister's wedding in 1978. So what happened? As my father told it, the other members of the *aarin* were total misfits. and my parents couldn't stomach living with this motley crew anywhere, let alone Israel, so they abandoned their dream. But my sister's Aliyah nearly 40 years ago got the ball rolling, and with Jordie's summer move, six of my parents' eight grandchildren are now Israeli citizens, and 17 of their 18 great-grandchildren are, too. My parents may have been frozen in their lives in the Diaspora, but I smile knowing that at least one young woman decided that the best way to improve Israeli-Diaspora relations was to transform Israel with her own hands.

For all of the aggravation of this past summer, we need to step back and affirm that we are living in the greatest moment of the last two thousand plus years of Jewish history. We have before us options unimaginable to our parents and grandparents. We live in a vibrant Jewish Diaspora, more affluent, better connected, and more secure than at any time in history, including the Golden Age of Spain. At the same time, we are sovereign in the land of our ancestors, having developed in barely 70 years a

Rabbi Dr. H. Joseph Simckes Life After Retirement <u>China, The Sleeping</u> Giant Awakes!

Mrs. Paskowski, my 3rd grade elementary school teacher in Salem, Mass. taught us long ago, "<u>Children, China is a sleeping giant and when it awakes, the entire</u> <u>earth will tremble</u>!". How prescient of her! If you have any doubts, check <u>The Economist, Foreign</u> <u>Affairs</u> or any other reliable source of geo-global information.

This past May, Beijing welcomed 28 heads of state to confirm its latest \$150 billion yearly investment (*that's 'illion' with a 'b'!*") in rebuilding its ancient SILK ROAD through 68 modern countries, creating a vast 21st century version of its old trade *land route* (with an added up-to-date *sea route,* thrown in) that will now enable China to challenge America as the world's dominant economic super-power!*

Indeed, ever since China dropped its obsessive ideologically-driven need to create a supreme, centrally controlled economy in 1978 and replaced it with an openmarket driven economy similar in logistics and functionality to modern capitalist economies![shh!], China, the-sleeping giant, has finally risen from its economic slumber and roared! It's economic growth-rate now is approaching 10% a year..."thus establishing itself as the fastest sustained expansion by a major economy in history!". Compare this with America's yearly growth-rate in 2016 : 1.8%!**

Do the leaders of the New York Stock Exchange know this? Are our Wall Street financiers aware of this staggering differential? What does Warren Buffet of Berkshire Hathaway industries have to say about this? Well, for one thing, Buffet, the Oracle from Omaha, has stated, <u>"When you go to the</u> <u>Middle East looking for oil, you</u> <u>don't stop in Israel. But if you are</u> <u>looking for brains, for energy, it's</u> <u>the only stop you have to</u> <u>make.</u>"***

Chinese investors have taken Buffet's advice seriously. As of May 11th, 2017, Chinese investment in Israel has jumped tenfold in one year to a record \$16.7 billion dollars, flooding that small Mediterranean country with Asian funding. It now owns some of Israel's most successful and profitable companies, i.e. Teva. The Chinese giant, apparently, has decided to cash in on little Israel's ranking as the number one "start up-nation in the world". Economic missions between China and Israel are booming. Besides its multi-billion investments in Israel itself, China is the largest single foreign investor in the entire Middle East, surpassing all others with a whopping 31.2%. That's a lot of yen, eh?!****

China has not forgotten the still lucrative U.S. market, either. Though China is 7,252 miles away from our shores, it has now overtaken Canada, America's immediate northern neighbor, as America's largest foreign investor. According to Forbes, a huge chunk of Chinese disposable wealth is now being invested in American real estate: \$93 billion dollars in U.S. residential plus \$17.1 billion in U.S. commercial properties...from New York to Chicago, Miami to Los Angeles .*****

Add to that the staggering amount of U.S. debt that China has al-

ready purchased and ask yourself, who is capable of pulling critical behind-the-scene strings in U.S. politics and economic affairs? Russia or our new commercial competitor from the orient, China? Our Bible taught us long ago to take careful note of powerhouse neighbors, i.e. Egypt, Assyria, Babylonia, etc. Their lust for power, greed and hegemony, according to Moses, Isaiah and Jeremiah and a host of other politically astute Hebrew prophets, were absolutely determinative factors in Israel's future security if not survival!***** That warning needs to be heeded today and applied to our American existential reality.

Indeed, the Torah, <u>our Scriptural</u> <u>survival-manual</u>, suggests some pretty important questions we should be asking in Washington, D.C. What role will Chinese investments in Israel, the Middle East, Europe, South America & in our own country play in the new international scene now unfolding in 2017-8?

That question should be raised to the top of our political policyagenda lest we soon find ourselves at the bottom of the international bucket.

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
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
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
